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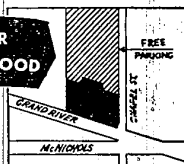

Trim Hedge Wider At Bottom For Best Growth

If you trim your hedge the way many people trim, with the top wider than the bottom, you won't have the nice hedge you should have.

That's because the top shades the bottom of the hedge and the lower part doesn't thicken properly. Joseph T. Cox, extension landscape specialist at Michigan State College, suggests that a hedge should be about six inches wider at the bottom than at the top, that's three inches wider on each side. That will let the bottom fill out and you will have a better looking hedge.

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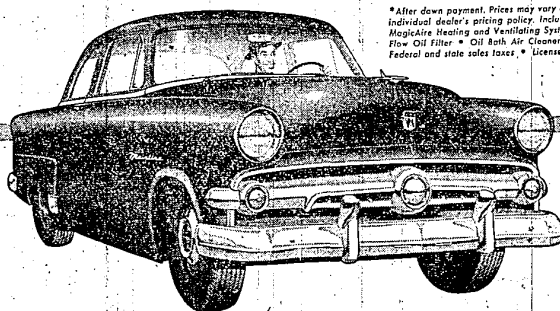
