Mr. and Mrs. George Ungeman returned on Friday from their honeymoon trip to Florida.


Charles Tricker, Jr., spent the week end in Ohio, where he attended the Ohio State Department convention of Amvets.

Sqdn. III, Civil Air Patrol, Attends State Meeting






