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DESIGNERS BEGIN REVIVAL OF FORMAL DINING FURNITURE

Designers have again begun to think in terms of the too long ignored formal dining room furniture, and for a fresh start that have put the stress on formal pieces especially designed for the room. This has resulted not only in the styling of modern dining pieces of a formal and elegant nature but also the revival of the more formal styles of the past. Thus, the 19th Century styles — Biedermeier, Empire and Directoire — are abundant.

Rendered in an idiom that retains traditional styles but shapes them to contemporary living needs, the new French formal dining room pieces, ranging from the informal to the decidedly elegant, give a new feeling to old forms. The mobile tea cart serves a relative newcomer even in the modern market, is now shown not only in a traditional design, but also adds a flip-out extension cupboard, and more shelves for greater versatility.

Making Pay Check Go Around Takes Some Sacrificing, Economists State

The problem of economizing, of making one's paycheck go around, is one that constantly bothers almost all of us. After we get through paying food, housing, medical, dental, and clothing expenses, then we come up against telephone bills, automobile expenses, insurance premiums, overdue bills of various kinds, and so on, and one other item that often gets us into trouble — ourselves in exchange for our allowance. All this is to assist from our need to save for possible future emergencies, for sending the children through college, and for our own old age.

There are several possible solutions to this problem, none of which can be said to be entirely satisfactory, say Michigan State College economists professors.

One possibility is to ignore the problem by borrowing an extra cash advance on your credit card. Small loan companies are doing a flourishing lending business today as testimony to the many millions who are using this device to solve the difficulty. You can borrow without collateral, without co-signers, without endorsers, and without seeing the consequences of your borrowing.

Another possibility is to start repaying the loan. You then find that the problem is worse than it ever was, with more and more of your paycheck going to repay past debts and less and less left for the current expenses which are as great as ever.

A second possibility is sharply to curtail one or more of your major expenses, such as those associated with clothing, car, or even food bill. But this solution would involve such a severe change in most people's habit patterns that it can hardly be considered as more than a laughable suggestion.

The last solution is to try to live within your budget by the traditional method of budgeting — listing all of your various expenses, computing the difference, cutting down on luxuries and things you need less than other things, keeping a record of how much penny is spent, and seeing how and where you can economize more next month than you did in the one just ended.

This method has definite possibilities, but if you start it you might as well resign yourself really to doing without certain things.

You will find, however, how much you really can afford to spend on various items and find out surprisingly how much you actually are spending on them. Unless you are prepared to do some cutting down where you find it really counts, you might as well waste time doing all the bothersome paper work. Just keeping the records, in itself, won't solve the problem.
