**TIPS GIVEN ON  
PUTTING ROBOAT  
IN TOP SHAPE**

Fishermen, now's the time to get that roboat in shape. If you haven't already done so.

If you're just getting started at this important task, here are some tips by Glenn P. Bruneau, supervisor of the University of Michigan's Wood Technology Laboratory.

You can remove the old finish with a paste-like paint and varnish remover. Use clean white gas to wash off the wax the thoroughly, starting with perhaps a medium-course paper, switching to medium fine and then to fine. Don't jump more than two divisions of paper when switching and you'll get better paint adhesion.

Caulk with a good grade of commercial caulking compound, that expands and contracts about as much as the wood when wet.

If your boat is to be finished clean, put on one coat of good tung oil or phenolic varnish sealer; add a medium-thick coat of clear marine spar varnish. When thoroughly dry, finish with a thinner coat of this varnish.

If you're painting, use a good marine primer, then a medium-thick coat of paint and then a thinner coat of the same color.

**NORTHVILLE TRACK  
HARNESS RACING  
STARTS JUNE 17**

Harness racing, which concluded at Hazel Park Saturday, will resume for 35 nights Thursday, June 17, at Northville Downs.

It will be the eleventh year for Michigan's pioneer pari-mutuel harness track. The meet will continue through July 31.

Improvements have been made to the grandstand, increasing the seating capacity, and an additional area has been added at the east end of the grandstand for those who desire to watch the field come around the turn into the stretch.

The barn, located at the head of the stretch, has been removed and replaced by an administration office building. The area in front of the track, has been covered with asphalt at a gradual elevation so that patrons can stand and still not bother persons in the rear.

At the south end of the new administration building, 52 mutual wagers have been added. The lavatory facilities have been improved at both ends of the grandstand and additional rest rooms placed at the far ends of the spectators' area. There also is a brand new building housing a modern kitchen and cafeteria.

More than that, the track operators have constructed a new barn in the stable area which is probably the most modern in this section.

**Archers Slightly Less  
Successful During 1953**

Archery hunters were slightly less successful during the 1953 deer season than they were during the 1952 season, a recently-completed conservation department survey shows.

Archers bagged about 1800 deer last fall compared to about 1850 the previous season.

About 30,700 persons bought archery licenses last year, compared with 29,340 the year before. Of those license buyers who actually hunted, six per cent bagged a deer last fall while in the previous fall 6.5 per cent were successful.

Conservation game workers, who conducted the poll, asked information from 1790 archery hunters and received answers from 96 per cent, about the same per cent of return as made by hunters in the previous year's poll.

**Giants Win Two In  
Babe Ruth League**

Babe Ruth League baseball play got under way in Farmington Saturday with the first game of a scheduled double-header being played while the second contest had to be halted due to rain.

Following the throwing out of the first ball by City Manager James Tennant, officially opening the 1954 season, the Farmington Enterprise Giants and the R. L. Polk Dodgers swung into action. Playing behind the brilliant two-hit pitching of Roy Temple, the Giants, last year's champions, downed the Dodgers 3-1. Bob Hug-Ne Tool Red Sox, 3-0. Lewis McClellan was the winning pitcher and allowed only four satellites in suffering the loss.

First baseman Larry Linch turned in a superb performance for the losing Dodgers in stopping two possible Giant runs from scoring by tossing runners out at third base.

The second contest between the Re-No Tool Red Sox and the Arrowsmith Indians, had to be called in early play due to the storm.

In action Monday night the Giants chalked up their second win of the season by edging the Re-No Tool Red Sox, 3-2. Lewis McClellan was the winning pitcher with Pat Novak suffering the loss.

Saturday's rained-out game between the Red Sox and the Indians will be made up at a later date.

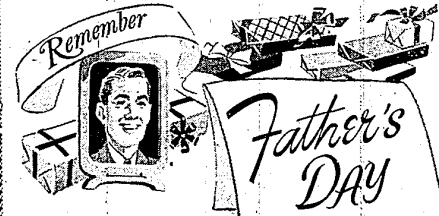
