Sealed bids for the purchase of Building and Site Bonds, Series 1954, to be issued by the Township of Farmington, Township of Farmington and Wayne Counties, Michigan, shall be received by the undersigned, at the office of the Board of Education, 3400 Thomas Street, Farmington, Michigan, until 8:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, on Thursday, the 8th day of July, 1954, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated June 1, 1954, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$1,000 each, will be numbered consecutively in the order of delivery of such bonds, and will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding 4% per annum, payable on November 1, 1954, and thereafter semi-annually on May 1 and November 1, 1954, and thereafter upon which it is submitted, expressed in multiples of 100, the interest rate for each coupon period on any one bond shall be at one rate only. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

Said bonds will mature serially on the 1st day of May in each year as follows: \$75,000 in the year 1955, \$150,000 in the year 1956, \$300,000 in the year 1957, \$100,000 in the year 1958, \$100,000 in the year 1959, \$100,000 in the year 1960, \$100,000 in the year 1961, \$100,000 in the year 1962, \$100,000 in the year 1963, \$100,000 in the year 1964, \$100,000 in the year 1965, \$100,000 in the year 1966, \$100,000 in the year 1967, \$100,000 in the year 1968, \$100,000 in the year 1969, \$100,000 in the year 1970 and 1971.

Bond Nos. 801 to 1,500, both inclusive, maturing in the year 1955 to 1971, both inclusive, are subject to redemption by the school district prior to maturity, at the option of the holder, on one or more interest payment dates on and after May 1, 1955. The interest on each bond in accordance with the following schedule: \$25 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1955 but prior to May 1, 1960.

\$25 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1960 but prior to May 1, 1962.
\$20 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1962 but prior to May 1, 1964 but prior to May 1, 1966.
\$15 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1964 but prior to May 1, 1966 but prior to May 1, 1968.
\$10 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1966 but prior to May 1, 1968 but prior to May 1, 1970.
\$5 if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1970.

Notice of redemption shall be published not less than 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the City of Detroit, Michigan, which carries as a part of its regular business notices of the sale of municipal bonds. The remaining bonds will not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Both principal and interest will be payable at such bank or trust company in the State of Michigan as shall be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds.

The bonds to be issued for the purpose of defraying the cost of erecting and furnishing new elementary school buildings in said school district, and will be the general obligations of the school district which is authorized and required by law to levy upon all the taxable property therein and ad valorem taxes as may be necessary to pay said bonds and the interest thereon, subject to such limitations upon the said taxing power as may result from the provisions of Section 21 of Article X of the Michigan Constitution and the Michigan Property Tax Limitation Act. The electors of said school district at an election held on March 28, 1954, increased the tax limitation by 3 1/4 mills for the years 1954 and 1955, both inclusive, and by 9 mills for the years 1956 to 1973, both inclusive, for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds and the establishment of a reserve therefor.

Pilot In Korea



WILLIAM V. MURPHY

Second Lieutenant William V. Murphy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles T. Murphy of 2926 Elm Street in Farmington, is now flying training missions with the "Cobra" squadron at the 51st Fighter Interceptor Wing in Korea, an Air Force release disclosed.

Now an F-86 Sabrejet pilot, Lt. Murphy entered in the Air Force in Detroit in September of 1952 and shortly afterward entered pilot training. He received his silver wings at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, in October, 1953. Prior to going to Korea he was stationed at Nellis Air Force Base in Nevada where he completed combat crew training.

Murphy is a 1952 graduate of Dartmouth College in New Hampshire. The interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of the bonds to be purchased from August 1, 1954, to their respective maturities and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the school district. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than their value will be considered.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$30,000 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the school district must accompany each bid, as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder. The forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid be accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of the successful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Berry, Stevens and Moorman, attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds. The cost of said legal opinion and of the printing of the bonds will be paid by the school district. Bonds will be delivered at Detroit, Michigan. The right is reserved to reject any or all bids.

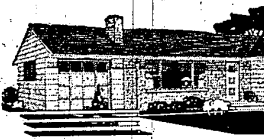
