## Fast Action Seen In Little League Last Week; Tigers Lose First Game

A full schedule of six Little League baseball games was played last week with the Tigers being dropped from the undefeated run when they were batted a 2 - 0 shutout at the hands of the second place Cards in the first game of Saturday's doubleheader. The Tigers and Cards are now tied for first place in the league, both with records of six wins and one loss.

Card pitcher Cliff Simons was the star of the game as he held the Tigers to three scattered hits and accounted for both of his team's runs with a timely two-base smash in the third.

Chuck Thompson, on the mound for the Tigers, suffered his first loss when he was batted a 2 - 0 shutout at the hands of the Cards in the second game of Saturday's doubleheader. He was batted for five hits.

In the second game on Saturday the Cubs won their first contest of the year by dropping the lowly Yanks, 6 - 4. A big first inning gave them a 4 - 0 lead and they added their last two in the fourth inning for what proved to be the margin of victory.

Jon Nelson was the winning hurler with Chuck Habermehl taking the defeat, having pitched for 12 hits in going the route.

Play was tight in contests earlier in the week as the caliber of action continues to improve in the league.

## FISHING CHAMPS AT KENT LAKE TO BE HONORED

Champion fishermen of Kent Lake in Kensington Metropolitan Park will be known by name by the end of this summer. The Huron - Clinton Metropolitan Authority is offering 21 trophies for the heaviest bass, pike and panfish caught in a contest starting at 6 a.m. Saturday, June 19, and closing at 10 p.m. Sunday, September 12.

Trophies will be given for both adult and junior catches. Fishermen 16 and under will be considered as juniors.

Headquarters is the Boat Rental Dock on Kent Lake, where catches will be weighed on a certified scale, measured and registered, from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. The contest is open to all fishermen within the park except employees of the Huron - Clinton Metropolitan Authority and their families and is subject to all Michigan Fish Laws and Kensington Park regulations.

Six trophies will be given for bass - largemouth and smallmouth being considered together; first, second and third prizes for first, second and third prizes for juniors. Six trophies in the same order will be given for bluegills or sunfish; and six, also in the same order, for crappie, rock bass or yellow perch.

Three trophies, first, second and third, are offered for pike, regardless of fisherman's age.

Weight is the first consideration in each class with length secondary in case of a tie.

"Every year we have reports of mighty fish caught in Kent Lake and this contest will enable catches to be officially verified and show just how good fishing is here," said David O. Laidlaw, park superintendent.

Consult rule forms and a map of the park showing boat launching sites, shore fishing sites and the rental dock are available at park offices and from neighborhood tackle and bait dealers.

## Little League Umpires Clinic To Be Held Here

Farmington has the honor this year of being selected as the city where the state Little League umpire clinic will be held. The clinic will be conducted Wednesday evening, July 14, at the Farmington High School gymnasium starting at 8:30 p.m.

It is expected that representatives from nearly all of the 36 Little League Associations in Michigan will be present at the clinic.

Howard W. Guir, umpire-in-chief of the National Little League Association, will handle the clinic. Guir is well known in Little League and is the author of the umpire's manual now used by all Little League groups throughout the nation.

## HAWKS, OWLS TO BE PROTECTED BY LAW AFTER AUGUST 12

At long last, hawks and owls are going to be protected by law. The recent Michigan Legislature passed an act, signed into law by the governor, that extends protection to the birds. The law ends a long fight by conservationists, Audubon Society members, the MUCC and other state groups to spare hawks and owls from indiscriminate killing.

The law takes effect at noon on August 12. After that date, it will be illegal to take hawks or owls except to remove or acquire a taste for chicken meat, or who are caught doing actual damage in some other way.

Hawks and owls feed largely on small rodents - rats, mice and probably some small game animals.

Except for a few members of the group, the birds are considered largely beneficial to man - at least to the extent that they are not detrimental to his interests. The numbers of game animals they kill and the instances of backyard thievery are considered negligible in view of their overall usefulness.
