Salk Polio Vaccine Trials Conducted Almost Entirely By Volunteer Help

Statistics revealed this week that one of the greatest medical experiments in history, the Salk polio vaccine trials, has been accomplished in Oakland County with almost entirely volunteer gratis hands.

Evaluation of the effectiveness of the new polio vaccine already has begun while filling still continues on the records of the 17,116 children who volunteered to undergo the three injections. Each record is being carefully studied as the case rate of new polio cases swings upward. Any child in the study group who contracts the disease will be given specialized attention.

Mrs. Howard Riegan of Birmingham, chairman of all volunteers for the county polio vaccine trials has completed a compilation of her 4,000 helpers in this project and finds that they had contributed over 9,132 hours of work from March 5 to June 18.

This figure includes 104 women who prepared preclinical supplies, request forms and instructions, and another 39 who packaged clinical supplies for distribution to the 148 schools participating.

The largest volume of volunteers assisted during the 1,332 hours of actual clinics. These clinics were held at each of the 148 county schools, with extra blood sampling clinics for 575 children in four schools. It was estimated that 2,000 school volunteers, including clinic aides, nurses, mothers, and school personnel contributed at least 5,932 hours during the vaccine trials.

The transportation committee, which shipped all clinic supplies and serum to and from headquarters at 1025 N. Telegraph Road, Pontiac, to the school clinics, recorded 5,000 miles of driving. This included rushing blood samplings to health department laboratories in Lansing and Ann Arbor to undergo extensive tests.

Mrs. Riegan pointed out that March of Dimes financed the vaccine trials supplies. However,

Mail Carriers Big Aid In State Pheasant Survey

Rural mail carriers have come through again to aid conservation work in Michigan, state game workers report.

A total of 432 of the carriers recently completed a survey of ring-necked pheasant populations in 13 southern Michigan counties. Their report supports earlier indications that the pheasant population is definitely larger this year than it was in 1953.

The carriers saw an average of four pheasants per 100 miles of driving. Last year, the average was 2.5 birds per 100 miles.

Last year, 565 carriers helped in the survey; the increase this year gives indication of the willing response carriers show for the work.

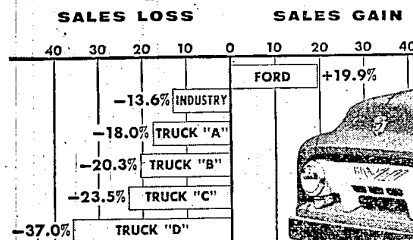
Farther north in the state, carriers count grouse and deer in other department surveys; results of a recently-completed poll are expected shortly.

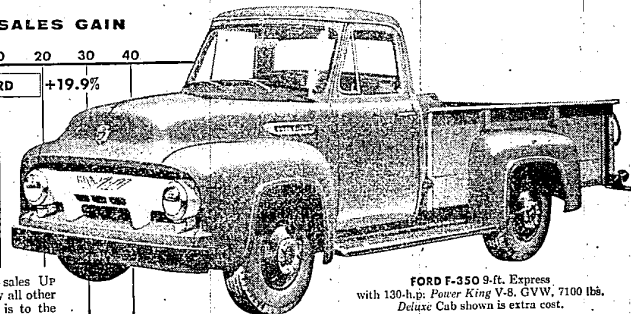

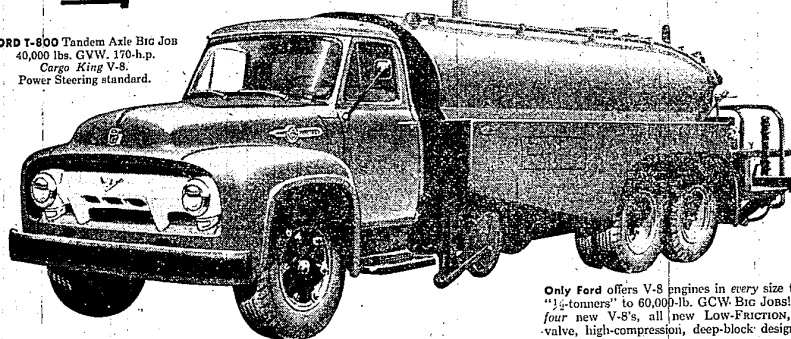
