CHEESE OFFERS VARIETY; TOPS IN FOOD VALUE

"Choose Cheese" for a concentrated form of nature's best food — milk, nutritionists advise. And a good many people heed that advice — Americans ate seven pounds of cheese per person in 1953.

Many good things come in a small package of cheese, says Roberta Hershey, extension foods specialist at Michigan State College.

Cheese contributes generous amounts of the calcium, riboflavin and protein needed in our diets. For example, three ounces of American cheese furnishes as much protein as four ounces of lean meat — and is usually cheaper. American cheddar cheese is available mild or sharp, to suit your family's tastes.

Processed cheese is fine for these reasons because it melts readily without becoming stringy. And processed cheese won't ripen or change flavor after being manufactured.

You can make an easy cheese and soup by melting a pound of processed cheese, cut into small pieces, over hot water in a double boiler. When it is melted, add one-third cup of milk and stir.

Serve over cooked fresh or frozen asparagus, broccoli, or green beans. Or perhaps you'd like baked fish fillets served with this sauce and a garnish of lemon and green pepper strips.

Remember that cheese must always be cooked at low temperatures or it will become hard and rubbery, cautions the MSC food specialist.

EGGS GOOD BUY NUTRITION-WISE, EXPERT ADVISES

You can get some delicious results by using eggs in your meals. And now is the time to use lots of them — they're plentiful and they're wearing attractive prices these days.

Eggs are an especially good buy nutrition-wise, point out Dr. Pauline Paul of Michigan State College's foods and nutrition department.

They are rich in high-quality protein and make an excellent replacement for meat in the diet. The yolks are high in iron, one of the minerals that is apt to be low in our diet.

Eggs are one of the most versatile foods we have, says Dr. Paul. Even prepared "as eggs," you have a choice of fried, boiled, scrambled, poached or baked.

Used as a thickening agent, they appear in sauces, soups, puddings and custards.

Beaten fluffy for a leavening agent, you'll use them in cakes, soufflés, angel foods, sponge cakes and omelets.
