

Service Facilities Installed In Bel-Aire Subdivision

CONSTRUCTION HAS STARTED ON
BEL-AIRE HILLS

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These are but two models of the proposed 450 homes to be built in the new Bel-Aire Hills homes.

With the completion of site grading last week at the new Bel-Aire Hills Subdivision in the northeast section of the City of Farmington, construction work was immediately started on a portion of the more than 400 modern ranch style homes planned for the new community.

According to builder Aubrey H. Ettenheimer, Rose Hill Builders, contracts have now been let and work begun on the laying of 50,000 feet of sewer and water mains for the subdivision. This work is scheduled for completion by August 15.

Work has also been started on the pouring of basements for a number of homes in the development, Ettenheimer added. Last week a request for an initial 121 building permits was made to the city by the Rose Hill Builders.

Over 100 homes in the new development have already been sold. Louis R. Hellman, president of the Rose Hill Sales Company, handling all sales for the Bel-Aire development, stated.

As soon as the task of installing sewer and water mains has been finished, work will be started on the paving of streets in the development.

All homes to be built in the new subdivision will be of ranch style, three bedroom, brick construction offering 22 exterior designs, both contemporary and traditional, and a choice of five different floor plans. The homes will have poured concrete basements and a new type of septic tank construction as well as many

HUNTERS IN STATE BAG 95,000 DEER IN '53, POLL SHOWS

Firearm hunters harvested about 95,000 deer from Michigan's herd last fall, the conservation department's post card poll shows.

The poll is complete with the exception of a few final touches, not expected to change final figures more than a small fraction.

The total is somewhat higher than early estimates indicated. For one thing, traffic surveys to

told immediately after the season showed that hunters took 15,000 deer during the special season in the northern lower peninsula; post card figures now show that about 25,000 were taken.

It was the second year the traffic survey was more conservative than the post card poll. The survey indicated that 92,000 deer were taken in the 1952 special season and the post card figures later showed that 110,000 animals were bagged.

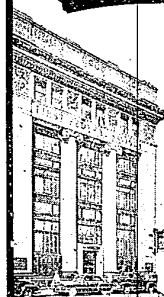

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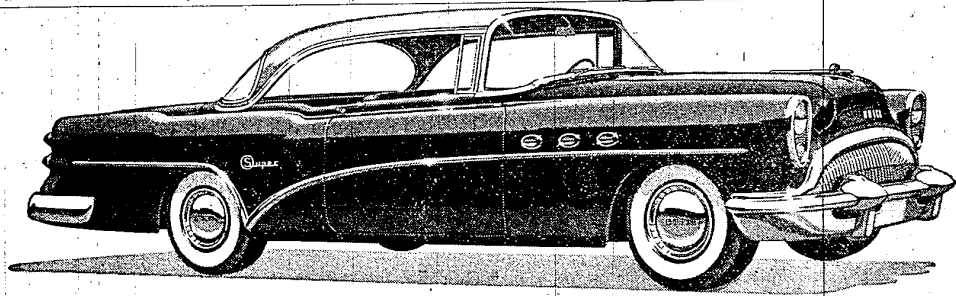

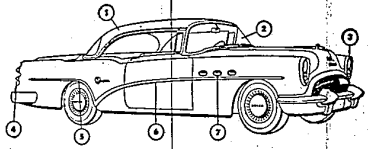
