RECOMMEND SAME SEASON FOR HARE, RABBIT THIS YEAR

Game workers have recommended no changes be made in the hare and rabbit seasons this year, and have suggested only slight changes in the squirrel hunting regulations, the conservation department reports.

Wildlife workers say that populations of cottontail rabbits are again good this year and that numbers of snowshoe hares are fair to good.

Changes in the squirrel regulations recommended include opening the entire upper peninsula to gray squirrels and no season for fox squirrels.
