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### Short On Blood; Donors Needed

A meeting of Oakland County Red Cross workers was held last Thursday at Colonial Manor, 12 Mile and Woodward, for the purpose of discussing the existing shortage of blood in the county. Attending from here were Mrs. Fred Lenz, Mrs. Edward Mosire and Mrs. Earl Lathrup.

Due to heavy rainfalls for blood in recent months, the group was told that an emergency situation existed and that badly depleted supplies must be built up.

To relieve the critical situation, each worker present was asked to make every effort to bring at least ten donors to a blood bank as soon as possible. The next blood bank will be held at the Zion Lutheran Church in Ferndale, on Albany Street, three blocks south of Nine Mile Road, on Tuesday, August 10. On Monday, August 16, a bank will be open at the Pontiac Elks Temple in Pontiac. Hours for both banks will be from 2 to 5 p.m.

Anyone who can give blood is urged to call Farmington 3000 and make an appointment for one of the banks. Transportation will be provided.

### Don't Roast While You're Baking

The kitchen is no place to spend these hot summer days. But even so, the family must be fed and must have at least one hot meal a day.

One solution lies in cutting down on the use of your oven during summer months and substituting an infrared rotisserie broiler that actually bakes. With height, working with a stainless steel appliance that's easy to keep clean and that offers visual cooking.

But that's not all. Your family can have foods that are barbecued, roasted, broiled, toasted, boiled, fried or grilled from this same broiler. Actually, in a very tiny kitchen, it's an ideal substitute for a stove.

The baking secret of this broiler lies in the tray, which slides into the unit and thus is automatically and thermostatically controlled. It turns itself off when baking is completed. And it can be used as a hot tray to be kept on the table, as a serving tray when used without heat and as a hot plate or grill.

Further, the broiler's timing mechanism can be used to turn off other electrical appliances.



Keep cool when performing those hot-weather cooking chores. An infrared rotisserie broiler takes care of nearly all cooking functions while adding a minimum quantity of heat to the atmosphere.

### Queen Of Queens To Be Selected

Once again the Michigan State Fair is looking for the Queen of all Michigan Beauty Queens.

Her title will be "Miss Michigan State Fair of 1954" and she will be chosen by well-known judges and crowned by Governor Williams on Wednesday, September 8. The State Fair opens September 3 and runs through September 12.

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### Authority Recommends Keeping A Complete Record In Freezing Food

Michigan homemakers will be getting into full swing this month on their food freezing operations. Berries and cherries are tops in the list in lower Michigan, along with beans and peas, says Mrs. Frieda Bennett, home demonstration agent for Oakland County.

She urges homemakers to label everything carefully and clearly before storing in the freezer. Use a wax or soft lead pencil, crayon, or special water-proof marking ink, she suggests.

Label with the name of the product, date frozen, weight or number of servings, type of pack, and anything else that will help identify the product when you are ready to use it.

If you rent a locker, include your name and locker number.

Keeping a complete record of foods frozen will help you use your locker or freezer more wisely.

You might keep a chart hung close to the freezer or a note-book handy close by.

Unless a record of everything is kept, you may find you have lost in the bottom or at the back of the freezer, remaining frozen longer than they should be of excellent quality. This list is also helpful in planning your meals.

It is a good idea to use all of one crop before the next year's crop is ready, the home agent advises.

Food specialists at Michigan State College say that vegetables and fruits keep 8 to 12 months, meats 4 to 12 months, and produce from a few weeks to 12 months. Plan to use your frozen foods while they are still in excellent condition.
