said lot and denies that he ever gave the petitioner any permission to do so. The inspector also states that the petitioner had submitted no plot plan or building plans and no application or request for permit to construct was secured.

TRAFFIC ACCIDENT DROP REPORTED IN FIRST HALF OF '54

Unusual as it may seem a reduction in both traffic deaths and injuries was recorded in Michigan in the first six months of 1954.

This encouraging information was disclosed in the State Police monthly statistical report, which showed that in June there was a decrease of 46 deaths, or 27 per cent, under the same month last year.

There were 127 persons killed and 4,743 injured in 14,408 accidents as compared to 173 killed and 4,232 injured in 14,515 accidents in June of 1953. Most of the June fatality reduction was in the rural areas and was attributed to a decrease in collisions between vehicles and run-off-roadway accidents.

May was the only month during the first half of the year that showed an increase in deaths, 132 being killed or 25 more than in June.

The totals for the first six months reveal a reduction of 82, or ten per cent, in deaths and 85, or four per cent, in injuries. Reported accidents increased 1,781, or two per cent.

Estimated mileage traveled during the first five months of 1954, figures available, was 10.5 billion, an increase of four per cent over 10.1 billion in the same period last year. The death rate of 5.6 per 100 million miles was down 11 per cent.

Weevils Now Reported Infesting Homes In State

Add the strawberry root weevil to the oat thrips and the flower hoppers infesting Michigan households. The brownish-black creature, about a fourth of an inch long, is not known to cause damage, but it is annoying.
