

Plan Dairy Display For '54 State Fair

The importance of the dairy industry of Michigan will be told in a special \$12,000 exhibit at the 1954 Michigan State Fair, September 2 through 12.

One of the objects of the exhibit will be to show the versatility of milk products. For instance, there will be several hundred kinds of cheese on display and an attractive counter of ice creams in unusual molded forms.

The various steps of the dairy industry, from the cow to the bottle of milk on the doorstep, will be depicted along with rather astounding facts about the industry.

Michigan, with 564,000 dairy cows, ranks 8th in the nation in total milk production, 7th in the amount of milk bottled, 4th in evaporated milk production, and 6th in butter and ice cream.

We're trying to help along on this goal, in the college which I serve as president we have a new School of American Studies. When it has been further refined in our "laboratory" of actual classroom experience, we expect to offer it to the nation's colleges and high schools. We consider that this will be another payment on our debt for the gift of freedom.

New Paint Product Sticks To Galvanized Pipes

Painting galvanized iron used to be an almost impossible job, because ordinary paint wouldn't stick to the smooth zinc surface and the vinegar and copper sulfate solution sometimes used did not help much.

Now all you have to do is clean the metal thoroughly with benzine or any other paint thinner. Then brush on a coat of galvanized metal primer containing zinc dust. Over this goes a good exterior paint, and the job's done.

Perhaps the biggest puzzle for the lander is what happens to trout after streams are stocked.

Previously it was the practice to stock fingerling trout in the streams. The idea was that they would "go wild" and become good game fish. This did not work out.

At present Conservation men dump seven-inch trout into streams. According to their best research procedures, this helps substantially for three weeks to a month. During this time, they estimate, from 25% to 75% of the trout are caught. But they cannot decide what happens to the ones that "get away". They cannot understand why they should or what happens if they do. All they know is "they are never seen again."

Problem on the Great Lakes is different. There the enemy is too few fish. The enemy is the sea lamprey.

The state is working with the federal government to rid these waters of the scaly parasite. Experts are sure that if they can "control" the lamprey to the extent that farmers control the corn borer, that the famous lake trout will be back in numbers almost as great as ever.

Electronic wires have been set up across 25 outlets emptying into Lake Superior. These are designed to prevent the lamprey from swimming upstream where he can spawn. Because of the life cycle of the lamprey, it will be four years before it can be determined whether electricity is successful in breaking the important link of the lamprey's life cycle. In the meantime, continuous research is being devoted to other ways to attack this costly menace to Michigan's fish world.

New GOP Emblem

Depleted here is the new vignette which will identify the Republican party of the November 2 General Election ballot.

The new party emblem was adopted by the Republican State Central Committee in honor of the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Republican Party.

It was on July 6, 1854, that a group of Michigan citizens joined with men from Ohio and Indiana to hold the first Republican State Convention at Jackson, Michigan. The Michigan group nominated a state of candidates who became the first Republican state officers in the nation.

"In keeping with the occasion, the State Central Committee decided to adopt a ballot emblem depicting Abraham Lincoln, the first Republican President, in whose administration the celebration of our 100th anniversary falls," said State Chairman John Feltkens.

"As we look at the new emblem, we are proud of the fact that from Abraham Lincoln to President Eisenhower, the Republican Party has represented freedom for all men and that under Republican Administration the American ideal of honesty and justice for all has been pursued vigorously."
