Road site and the Shawwasen -

Caution Urged In Using Products Kept In Pressurized Containers

The increasing list of house-
hold and garden products being
dispensed in pressurized con-
tainers undoubtedly proves a
great convenience to adults, but
can be a hindrance in the hands of
children. The following is a list
of products which should be kept
from children, according to the
Institute for Sater Living.

One principal danger is that
children with normal curiosi-
ty may succeed in releasing the
pressure in the can without
regard for the direction in the
use of the product. This could easily
result in a blinded eye or other
body injury.

He said that the hazard, how-
ever, which holds the greatest
probability is that of inhaling the
spray from some harmful sub-
stance such as an insecticide, gar-
den and live-stock compound,
paint, or lacquer. Particularly
harmful when drawn into the
throat and lungs are oil-base
sprays which tend to cause respi-
ratory disturbances.

Some pressurized materials now
on the market are highly flam-
mable and present a distinct fire
hazard in the hands of children
who may release them near a
source of ignition such as a flame
of electric appliance.

"These hazards can be just as
harmful to adults if they do not
apply common sense in the use
of pressure sprays," stated
Mr. Johnson. "This could easily
result in a blinded eye or other
body injury."

He listed the following pre-
cautions for making the home
"spray safe": (1) Set aside a sepa-
rate cabinet for storage of all
containers holding materials un-
der pressure. Make sure that the
cabinet cannot be opened by chil-
dren. Keep locked if necessary.

(2) Always read the label to
make sure that you are using the
right container. (3) Return con-
tainers to storage cabinet immedi-
ately after use.

(4) Be sure that children are
warned that they are not to use
any of the containers.

**VARIETY OF THROW
RUG STYLINGS NOW
BEING OFFERED**

When most people think of
throw rugs they think of hit-and-
miss cottons or bathroom chen-
illes, but there is a surprise await-
ing at department stores.

Now you can buy small accent
rugs styled by some of the na-
tion's top designers. There are
countless striped patterns in cot-
ton rugs. Other patterns range
from the simple design to Scotch
plaid and whimsical Staffordshire
dogs. Some are made of cotton,
some of wool, some of man-made
fibers.

The inspiration for one new,
medium-sized rug came from
costly imports from Morocco. It
shows a gridwork pattern of
rayon with cotton tufts filling in
the squares.

Some broadloom carpetings
have such style and color that in
fact they may form effective
area rugs. And new versions of
that old favorite, the braided rug,
are appearing in surprising decor-
ator colors. Some have metallic
threads in the pile; others look like
braided cotton, but are really
made of vinyl that wipes clean.

You'll find a rug size to fit any
portion of furniture. From two
feet by three feet up. Choose a
conventional shape or have the
edges cut to a free form. You
can be sure they'll flatter your
room, for throw rugs have "gone
cinquante."

**STORK OUT TO SET
NEW RECORD IN
STATE DURING 1954**

It looks like another busy year
for the stork.

The birth registration reached
an all-time high of 181,518 births
in Michigan last year, Michigan
Department of Health provisions
figures indicate, but 1954 is well
on the way towards passing even
this record.

For the first six months of 1954,
the State Health Department con-
tinues, 79,515 births have been
registered, an increase of 6,012
over 1953.

Since the year ahead of 1953 figures
compared with '52, the State
Health Department adds. (The
total yearly increase in 1953 over
the previous year was only about
4,900.)

The State Health Department
says that the birth increase is
part of a trend that started be-
fore World War II. And since
1940, when there were 99,106
live births registered, the num-
ber of births has nearly doubled,
they add.

water plus the nearly all-day rain
Sunday has raised the water level
considerably in the two existing
wells. Sallow added that this al-
lowed the build-up in the water
tank for necessary protection. Of-
ficials indicated that there may

strictions if the situation continues
to improve at its present rate.

Gives Directions For Freezing Fresh Peaches

Fresh peaches are easy to freeze
and will be a real treat this winter.
Freeze them in sirup if they are
to be served as a sauce, or pack
in sugar for pies and puddings.
Select firm, ripe, uniformly yellow
Hale, Elberta, or any good-
flavored freestone. To pack in
sirup: Dissolve three cups of sugar
in four cups of hot or cold water.
If hot water is used, cool sirup
before using. Gently stir in one
teaspoon ascorbic acid, citric acid
or lemon juice per quart of cooled sirup
to preserve color.

Four about one-half cup sirup
into each pint container. Place
halved or sliced peaches directly
in sirup. Add sirup to cover.
Place a small piece of crumpled
cellophane on top of fruit to keep
it in the sirup.
