posed service for the handling of rubbish and garbage in the city. Details of the program will be included in the proposed ordinance. Action was taken by the Council to begin the drafting of plans for a public parking area between Thomas Street and Oakland Avenue in rear of the stores facing on the north side of Grand River. It was suggested that the area include about four lots and be located on the west end of the block near Farmington Road.
The Council, in answer to a request from the township, agreed to submit a cost figure for what the city would require for its interest in the town property. The figure is expected to be filed with the township in the next few days.
Representatives of E. T. Wilkins and Associates appeared before the Council to explain their service in providing scientific appraisals of personal and real property. The Council agreed to study the possibility of securing the services of this organization.
Richard Dever, 33676 Alta Loma, appeared before the Council again in connection with grading and drainage of the property adjacent to his home. The Council stated that because of the high cost, the city would be unable to affect any permanent improvement. They did agree to put in a catch basin in rear of the Dever home and do some ditching as a temporary measure.
