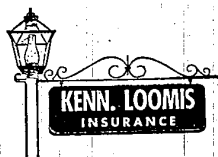


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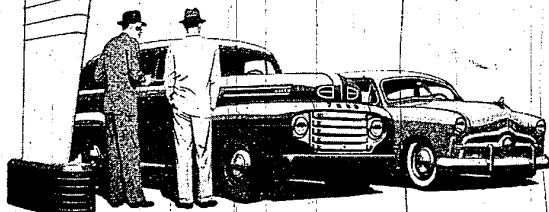

istered prior to the opening of school.

Junior and Senior High School registration, which opened Wednesday, will continue through Friday, September 3. High school students are to register at the new building on Shawnessy while junior high school boys and girls are to register at their regular classroom building on Thomas Street. Registration is being conducted week days from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

ALL STUDENTS in the elementary grades and high school are requested to secure their books prior to the opening of classes on September 9. The book store, which is located in the basement of the junior high school building on Thomas Street, will remain open on week days through September 4 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. For the convenience of students who are unable to secure books during regular hours, the store will be open September 2, 3, 9 and 10 from 6 to 8 p.m. and on September 11 from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

WORK ON STREETS IN KEMBERTON SUBNOW UNDER WAY

Work is progressing on the reconstruction of roads in the Kemberton Park Subdivision, west of Middlebelt and north of Nine Mile Road. Ernest Blanchard, Township Supervisor, announced this week. Blanchard stated that all of the roads in the subdivision are being brought up to County Road Commission specifications. A total of six roads are involved in the project, including Tulane, Albion, Colgate, Purdue, Astor and Greyfield. The township has agreed to pay for the cost of the road improvements with the property owners purchasing the individual culverts.

REQUEST FINAL BUILDING PERMITS IN BEL-AIRE SUB

Building permit applications have been filed for all of the remaining lots in the Bel-Aire Subdivision, city officials announced this week.

A total of 367 permits have been secured or applied for by developers of the subdivision, officials added. Construction is already well under way on the homes in the eastern section of the development. In addition to the residential lots, frontage has been allocated along the east side of Orchard Lake Road from Ten Mile Road south, for the development of a commercial center.

(Continued from Page One) The excavation and footings before the stop order was issued. Boren filed an appeal with the zoning board, requesting permission to continue construction "because of the unusual conditions pertaining thereto and the fact that the restrictions would work an undue hardship upon the applicant if compelled to adhere to the strict letter of the ordinance."

Following two hearings, the Zoning Board voted to uphold the action of the building inspector. Boren then filed the Petition for Mandamus in Circuit Court.

Westlake, Board member, informed the board of the work that has been done thus far by township officials in trying to find a solution to the problem.

A number of property owners strongly criticized the Board for not giving the matter more serious consideration and ignoring the requests of property owners. Several charges that this situation has existed for a number of years and that the people are getting tired of waiting.

John Vogt, representative of the State Health Department, was introduced and pledged his cooperation in attempting to work out a solution. He stated that he was present at the meeting as a result of the property owners' letter to Governor Williams. Vogt pointed out that three possibilities existed as far as a source of water is concerned. These included tying into the Detroit system, securing sufficient ground wells in the township, or possibly hooking into the City of Farmington system.

Following his appointment as chairman, Dr. Gudaw stated that the committee will give the Board a reasonable time to come up with a plan before a meeting is scheduled. In the meantime, he urged all residents to continue attending the Township Board meeting until some definite program is worked out.
