### SHARP INCREASE NOTED IN COUNTY BUILDING PERMITS

Single unit home building in the Detroit Metropolitan area, including Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties, has been going on at a rapid pace for the past 4 1/2 years with no easing off apparent.

In Oakland County alone a total of 35,361 new one-family units have been built during the period from January of 1950 to July of this year, the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission reports.

Farmington Township ranks high among the areas where this stepped up building program has been going on and is one of the 12 locations registering building gains of over 1,000 occupied dwelling units.

The building increase for the 4 1/2 year period in Oakland County has been approximately 32.4 per cent yearly over the yearly average established during the previous ten year period. An average per year of 8,320 units has been recorded since 1950 as compared with an annual average of 2,625 units between 1940 and 1950.

Increases in Farmington Township are slightly above the overall average in the county during the 4 1/2 year period. A 34.6 per cent increase in building was registered in the township.

All trends indicate that heaviest building is to continue away from the City of Detroit. In the 1946 to 1950 period Detroit accounted for two out of every five additional occupied units built. From 1950 to the present only one out of every five additional single family homes have been built in the city proper.

### Charles Larson Among Legionnaires Attending National Convention

Headed by state commander Kent T. Lundgren of Menominee, 146 Michigan American Legion delegates and their friends and families left Monday for the 30th annual national Legion convention in Washington, D. C., August 30 through September 2.

Included among the Michigan contingent is Charles Larson of 22130 Cora, recently elected by Legion members of this Congressional District to represent them in official expression on national business matters that will affect some three million Legionnaires world-wide.


This is the first time a national Legion convention has been held in the nation's capital. It is expected that more than 150,000 will crowd the Capital City in one of the largest Legion gatherings in a decade.

The Michigan Legion is sponsoring a candidate for national commander at this year's convention, he is J. Addington Wagner, Battle Creek attorney, past state commander and presently chairman of the national American Legion.

President Eisenhower will share the spotlight with Dr. Konrad Adenauer, chancellor of the Federal Republic of Germany, in addressing the opening session of the 3,510 delegates.

Other notable speakers will include Francis Cardinal Spellman, Admiral Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Walter B. Reuther, president of the CIO; Henry Cabot Lodge, U. S. ambassador to the United Nations; Miss Maurine Walker, president of the national education association; and Harvey Hingley, administrator of the Veterans Administration.
