Open September 8

Farmington families are cordially invited to the annual Outdoor Art Festival of the Kirk-in-the-Hills Presbyterian Church, to open on September 8 and continue through September 11 at the church grounds in Bloomfield Township. Exhibition times are from 1:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. each day. The church is located on West Long Lake Road, one half mile west of Telegraph.

Dr. Harold C. DeWendt, Minister, announces that the people of the Kirk have been hard at work all summer on the arrangements for a better-than-ever art festival this year. On display will be many works of art exhibited by artists from Michigan, other states, Canada and Mexico. There will also be a special crafts section of the festival this year covering ceramics, silver work, wrought iron, metalwork, jewelry, fabrics and furniture.

This is the third year for the exhibit, the only one of its kind in the country. The beautiful lawns of the Kirk provide an ideal setting for the display of art subjects and will give visitors an opportunity to view the paintings in an informal atmosphere.

The festival will be a non-jury exhibition open to both amateur and professional artists, and all works will be offered for sale. This will give many families an opportunity to buy art subjects and gives the artists an appreciative market for their works. In addition, there are \$3,000 in awards offered for outstanding work.

TIPS FOR CHEESECAKE

Two reasons why cheesecakes fail are the baking temperature and the cheese ingredient used. Cottage cheese varies a lot in moisture content, causing many cake failures. If you can't buy dry cottage cheese, carefully drain off the excess cream. Too much heat also causes failures, so bake the cheesecakes in a moderate oven (350 degrees).
