A JUST SENTENCE.

Banker Morse' sentence of 15 years' imprisonment was a severe one, but the penalty appears to have been a just one, in view of the fact that the punishment was required, not only as a lesson to the guilty man, but as a solemn warning to others not to juggle the money of other people.

Lacking capital with which to conduct his Wall street gambling operations, Morse established and bought banks to supply him with money to use, and took the chances. If the market had not gone against him, nobody would have lost any thing. It did go against him, and the bank funds were sunk in the speculations. The owners of the funds were thus made in voluntary gamblers, and their fortunes were made subject to the rise and fall of stocks.

Morse did not expect to lose. But that counts for nothing. He had no more right to use the fund in that manner than a eashier has to withdraw a package from the vault to risk on a tip. It was dishonesty pure and simple and he must suffer the consequences of departure from the straight road. His l'inks were bought, not for legitimate operations, but in order t, have at his command a credit which properly managed banks would refuse to him, and as his operations became more and more extended his banks became more and more involved in them, so that their fate was bound up with that of his spec-

His management of the banks was governed, not by the banking principles, but by the exigencies of his own situation, If he needed money he took it regardless of security. His own account was liberally overdrawn Loans of huge sums were account was liberally overtrawn Looms of long sound and the manes of dummies. The money of one bank was used to give a fictitious value to stock which it held as collateral, on which other banks in the chain accepted as collateral at the fictitious value. All the time he was walking on the cade of the precipice. And to conceal what he was doing from the comptroller of currency he was compelled to make false entries.

Then the crash came,

To say that he faced the music and stood trial is a credit perhaps to his nerve, but not to his honesty. That was shattered beyond repair. There were really no extensing circumstances. The crime was deliberately committed and the penalty seems a just one. If the lesson shall serve as a warning to other speculative bankers to deal honestly with the funds entrusted to their care, it will serve its purpose.
