ALL-TIME RECORD BEING SET IN STATE PARK USE

Duty-use attendance in Michigan's state parks is already one million visitors above the 1953 record, conservation department records show.

Also, an all-time high in the use of parks by campers has been set this year.

As of August 30, state park attendance totaled 13,064,000 visitors; last year at that date, the total was 12,063,000. And to the same date this year, nearly 72,000 camping permits were issued where 56,000 had been issued last year.

Officials of the department's parks and recreation division say the day-use record of 14,152,000 set in 1953 is almost sure to be broken.

Most surprise was expressed at the high camp use made of parks. "There seems no ceiling in sight on this camp use," one official said. "Early season estimates have already gone by the board and there is still the considerable fall use to come."

Three Local CAP Members Awarded

Three members of the Farmington Civil Air Patrol Squadron were awarded certificates of accomplishment following completion of courses at the CAP summer encampment at Selfridge Air Force Base Saturday. Those winning certificates for successfully completing 80 hours of training were Sergeant Charles Stryer, Sergeant Lee Williams, and Corporal David Williams.

The courses, which ran from August 23 through September 4, were taken by 300 male and 58 female CAP members from Michigan. The training was part of a yearly summer encampment program.

The recently organized Farmington CAP is now making plans to form a local squadron. As soon as a regular meeting place can be obtained the group will start an enrollment drive to obtain squadron strength.

At the present time the Farmington group has ten senior CAP members and 15 cadets.

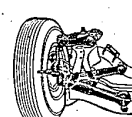

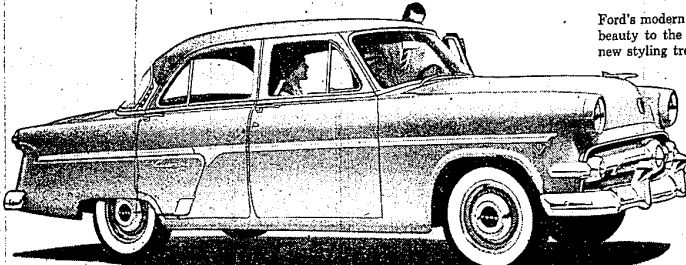
