NATURAL GAS USERS REQUESTED TO MAKE EQUIPMENT CHECK

Users of natural gas are reminded that colder weather is on the way. Your natural gas heating equipment will keep you warm if it is in proper operating condition. Now is the time for you to safeguard your comfort by making a complete check of your equipment, officials of Consumers Power stated this week.

Most gas heating customers keep their furnace pilots litched through the summer in order to have heat instantly available as needed and to minimize moisture condensation and rusting. If you follow this practice your furnace pilot is lighted now. Test the operation of the furnace by advancing the thermostat lever above room temperature and observing whether the burner operates normally. If you have shut the pilot off and are accustomed to lighting it yourself, light the pilot, then make the same test.

If the burner fails to operate when the thermostat is set above room temperature, move the thermostat lever to the lowest point and notify your dealer so that he can inspect your furnace and make any repairs that may be necessary.

Consumers officials revealed that if your pilot is out and you wish them to light it they will do so for a small fee. They request, however, that you call early and avoid the big "rush later" in the fall.

Harvest Moon Sunday To Herald Arrival Of Fall On September 23

The appearance of a shining Harvest Moon heralding fall's arrival will be among September's astronomical activities, according to the University of Michigan's Miss Hazel M. Losh.

The Harvest Moon is scheduled to appear September 12 at 3:19 p.m. It is the full moon occurring nearest the autumnal equinox, scheduled to begin at 8:56 a.m. on September 23 when the sun crosses the equator on its way south. She points out, "This day the sun rises and sets at the east and west points of the horizon and the day and night will be said to be equal, she adds.

"This is not strictly true, though, the professor adds. For as the sunlight enters the atmosphere, it comes into a more dense region and its light is bent so that it appears to be "lifted," making the sun visible before it comes above the horizon and after it sets.

Among September's constellations with the legendary and famous Pegasus, Andromeda and Perseus, rising in the east and northeast just after sunset, East-to-west, to identify is "The Great Square of Pegasus" or "The Big Diamond," marked by four stars equidistant apart.

"The northeast corner star of Pegasus is really a star of Andromeda," Professor Losh continues, "and its four bright stars stretch in a line parallel to the horizon. Legend says the constellation is the image of the heroine Andromeda chained to a rock by the sea where she awaits death, until rescued by Perseus.

Above Andromeda's third star is the Great Nebula, which is similar to our own Galaxy or Milky way system, Miss Losh states. "It is the most distant object seen by the human eye unaided," she adds.

Close to, and north of, Andromeda is the gallant hero Perseus, a rough K-shaped figure with the Little League Banquet Set For September 13
