AUTO GLOVE BOX POOR HIDING SPOT, PARK RECORDS SHOW
One of the quickest ways to lose money, watches and other valuables is to stuff them in auto glove compartments, conservation workers have found.
Thieves from parking areas at several popular southern Michigan state parks generally indicate that victims have tried to hide valuables only to be tripped up by observant thieves.
"Some of these thieves can enter a locked car without a key about as fast as the owner can with a key," says Arthur C. Elmer, chief of the state park system.
During busy periods, guards are posted at many parking areas in the park system, and to date this year several arrests have been made. Almost invariably, the thieves had entered locked automobiles and removed valuables from the glove compartments.
But with short budgets and busy periods, state park workers are unable to provide enough parking lot protection.
"The best answer," says Elmer, "is to keep valuables in hand."
Fifty thousand plastic bathtubs are being made annually, mostly for trailers. Most are beginning to use them and households will be next. The tubs are easy to clean, lightweight, and don't chill the epidemics on contact.
