PUBLIC PRAISED FOR COOPERATION IN FIRE PREVENTION

The public received a pat on the back this week from the conservation department for its excellent cooperation in the prevention of forest fires during the summer.

By the end of the second week in September, only 3,564 acres were burned in the entire state; a far cry from the 17, 18 and 19 thousands of acres burned during similar periods in the 1940's.

"The public shows more concern in a ten-acre fire now than it did in a 500-acre fire 15 years ago," commented M. M. Dergman, assistant chief of the department's field administration division.

"People are much more fire conscious than ever before. They cooperate with the department in reporting fires and whenever possible they help suppress them. But their greatest contribution is in fire prevention."

Sturgeon Fishing Allowed In January And February

Inquiries received by the conservation department indicate a misunderstanding on the part of many regarding regulations on fishing sturgeon.

The department points out that these fish may be taken from inland waters only during January and February.

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
