

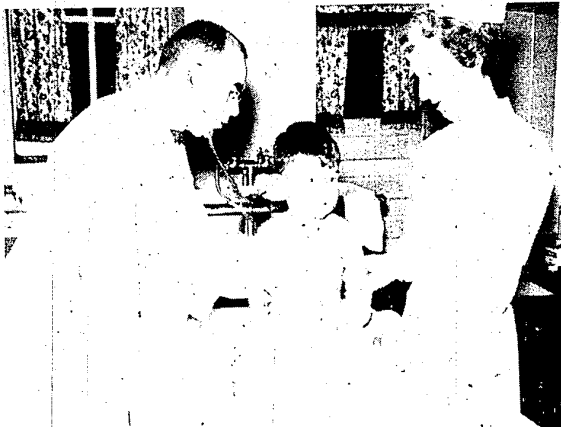

Farmington Well Baby Clinic Highly  
Successful In Year Of Operation

In its first year of operation, the Farmington Well Baby Clinic, sponsored by the local Business and Professional Women's Club, has proven very successful, officials state.

The clinic is held the third Wednesday of each month from 9 a.m. until 12 noon in the basement of the Salem Evangelical and Reformed Church in Farmington. It is made possible through the combined cooperation of the Michigan Department of Health, Oakland County Department of Health, Oakland County Medical Society and private Farmington area physicians.

Physical examinations are made available for all children six weeks to five years of age whose parents live in Farmington City or Township and who are unable to care for their needs otherwise. Immunization against whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus as well as vaccinations against small pox are also administered.

Time and thought were devoted to the physical aspects of child development. Parents are helped to understand normal growth and development so that they may better

evaluate changes which occur in methods of child care and guidance. The Farmington Business and Professional Women's Club wishes to acknowledge with thanks and gratitude the help and cooperation of the women from the city and township who have helped make the clinic a success.

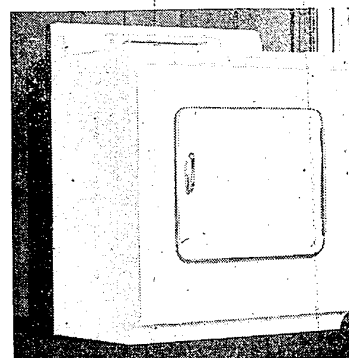

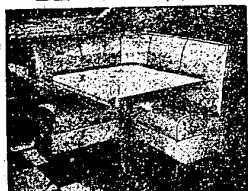

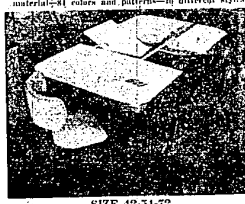
