The home cooked meal will be offered to all from 5:30 to 8:00 p.m.

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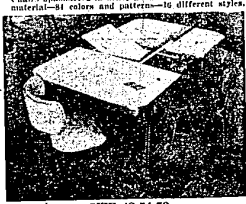
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
