

PERSONS CARRYING LOADED FIREARMS APPREHENDED

It is against the law to carry a loaded firearm in a game area within 15 days of the opening of small game season. It is also illegal to carry a loaded firearm in a vehicle. Reports were received in conservation department headquarters early this week that 35 persons were apprehended violating those two laws during recent days. Fourteen persons violated fishing laws and 23 others broke various laws protecting game birds and animals. The 63 reported violations were contained in the department's weekly list of violators.

State Halts Purchases Of Red Pine Cones

With 7366 bushels now on hand, Michigan's conservation department this week halted purchase of red pine cones in the upper and northern lower peninsulas.

P. J. Hodge, in charge of state nursery operations, says that about 3000 persons — families and individuals — took part in gathering cones during recent weeks. Seeds from the cones will be used at the three state nurseries during the next five to eight years.

PAPER ON GROUND UNDER BASEMENTLESS HOUSE PREVENTS FLOOR ROT, EXPERT SAYS

If you have one of those basementless houses, now is the time to crawl underneath it to cover the soil.

That's the warning from Arthur Bell, Michigan State College extension agricultural engineer. With cold weather coming, the moisture from the soil will condense on the floor boards and joists. Then it won't be long before the wood will start to decay.

Bell points out that the remedy is simple. The cover, laid on the wet soil under a house, acts as a barrier against the rising moisture. The cover may be asphalt

coated paper such as roll roofing, laminated papers with a waterproofing material, or thin metal foils. He advises lapping the cover 2 or 3 inches. When the soil is covered under the house, says Bell, it is possible to safely close the ventilating spaces on the foundations in cold weather to conserve heat. He also suggests nailing one-inch insulation on the bottom of the joists underneath the house.
