## CHILL LARGE HAMS

Small, 1½-pound canned hams can be stored at room temperature, but it is necessary to keep large hams refrigerated. Canned hams weighing three pounds or more are heated only enough to complete their cooking, and not to protect against spoilage. To allow these hams to be stored at room temperature, they would need longer cooking at high temperatures. This would make the ham unpalatable.
