ADD SERVICE, MOVE SUNDAY SCHOOL AT GRACE LUTHERAN

Grace Lutheran Church, Grand River at Imperial Highway, will now hold three morning services and the Sunday School will be moved to Stuckey School beginning Sunday, October 17, church officials announced.

Stuckey School is located at 25000 Fargo, corner of Kinloch, in Grand Township.

Old St. Paul Church Back In Service



The old white frame St. Paul Lutheran Church, a landmark for over half a century at the corner of Middlebelt and Eight Mile Road, was moved last week to a new location at Middlebelt and St. Martins in Livonia. It will be used by the Kenwood Church of Christ as a worship center at the new site. The picture above was snapped in front of the Clarenceville High School last Friday afternoon as the church moved down Middlebelt Road.

After 60 years of continuous service, the old St. Paul Lutheran Church, waiting to be demolished after being replaced by a modern, new \$12,000 building, was called back into use again.

Moved six blocks down Middlebelt to St. Martin Street in Livonia, it will now be known as the Kenwood Church of Christ.

Seeing in the building a chance to relieve his problem of rapid growth in worshippers without a good place to meet, Pastor E. C. Crandell bought the church. Prior to this time, since the Kenwood Church of Christ was first formed two years ago, followers had been meeting in a rented hall.

According to the pastor, he had hopes of a new building but his congregation from the Farmington - Livonia area was growing so rapidly he could not wait. With the new meeting place, the number in the congregation is expected by Pastor Crandell to double within the next three months and to continue to increase to nearly 200. At the present time there are 70 members in the congregation.

The Reverend Crandell is only 26 years old, fresh from divinity school after two years of service in the Navy Hospital Corps.

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Attend Meeting, Tell Of Work At Local Hospital

Eight local women were in attendance recently at a one-day conference of the Southeastern Michigan Horticultural Therapy Council held in Birmingham.

The meeting was held to encourage and stimulate more groups to make visits to mental institutions, children's hospitals, and old people's homes and work with patients in growing plants and arranging flowers. The therapeutic value of such activity has been recognized and is now being awarded a place in hospital programs.

Such a program is now being sponsored by the Farmington Garden Club at the Children's Convalescent Hospital here. Appearing before the group at the conference, Mrs. Paul Calkins of the local club told of the work being done at the convalescent home by her group.

Each Wednesday four to six women go to the hospital with flowers, seeds, ribbons and other items to work with the children. Mrs. Calkins told the gathering they help them in making corsages, bouquets and arrangements for their dinner tables. Patients call them "Flower Ladies" and eagerly await the visits.

"We are dependent, for the most part, on funeral bouquets," Mrs. Calkins said, "and therefore encourage everyone to speak to their funeral director if they have flowers to spare. He cooperates in seeing that the flowers reach the volunteers for use at the hospital."
