

Trojans Lose Heartbreaker To Clarkson

A battling Clarenceville Trojan eleven fought back gamely against a favored Clarkson team in the final quarter last Friday but fell one point short of their opponents' mark and lost a heartbreaker, 13 - 12.

Making the loss more heart-breaking was the fact that Clarkson's winning TD came with the Trojans short one man on the field.

The two teams played to a scoreless tie through the first half. On the opening kick-off of the second half, however, the Clarkson grid-ders began to move and powered 73 yards to pay dirt with Larry Gault skirting the last 3 yards. Ralph Yankee's conversion bot was good and Clarkson led 7 - 0.

Shortly afterward the enemy scored their second touchdown. A fumble by Bob Soop on his own 26 was recovered by Clarkson and they were back in possession of the pigskin again. On the exchange of players one defensive man failed to go in and the Clarkson eleven made good advantage of it. They sent Larry Gault around the end and he romped the length of the field to score.

The Trojans came back strong in the final period and pushed over with 73 yards on long, sustained drives of 63 and 70 yards. Bob Soop and Gene Garbis accounted for the TD's. Both conversions tries by running, however, failed.

This Friday the Trojans will travel to Holly in hopes of getting back on the victory trail again.

TABLE TOP TRICK

If you don't like that right-angle gap between table top and drop leaves, you can get a neat joint and a 2-inch top easily. Make a strip of matching wood to fill the space. Blunted nails in the striping fit into holes made in the side edge of the leaves and hold the strip in place. You'll have a trim table surface, the hinges won't show, and the strip comes off in a jiffy when you want to have the drop leaves up.

Southfield Racks Up Three TD's In First Half To Dump Falcons 20-7

The fact that it was Homecoming Day at Farmington High last Friday had little effect on the Falcon grid-ders as they went down in defeat at the hands of the Southfield Jays, 20 - 7.

This made it the fifth straight loss for the Falcons this season and the twelfth setback in a row since tasting victory midway in the season last fall.

It was the Bluejays' game from start to finish. They piled up a 20-point lead in the first half and played a defensive game throughout the last two quarters.

Early in the first period the Southfield eleven proved that they meant business. A 25-yard pass brought the ball to the Falcon 23 with a sweep moving it up to the 15. Then on another nice flip the Jays hit pay dirt. The conversion boot was good and they led 7-0.

With four minutes left to the half, Southfield pushed over their second TD. A long run carried the ball to the 10 with another good to the one-foot line. Three plunges into the line and they

were over. On the next exchange of the ball the Bluejays tallied again. Despite three penalties, they needed only six plays to pass and drive to pay dirt.

Showing some new spark in the second half the Falcons were able to hold their own defensively but were able to push over only one touchdown.

The Falcons' lone tally came in the third quarter when they took possession of the pigskin on the 16 and with a penalty on the first play moved up to the 31. A pass from Rice to Robinson behind Jay defenders clicked and he scampered over for the TD. Rice ran the ball over for the extra point.

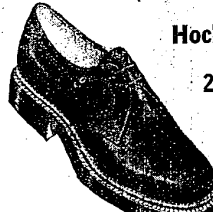
Late in the final period the Falcons made another bid to score but were unable to drive over. The game ended with the Jays in possession and running out the clock.

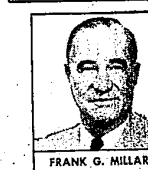

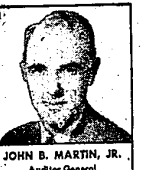
