Well Baby Clinic Starts In Livonia

The opening of a Well Baby Clinic at the First Federal Savings and Loan office at Sheldon Center in Livonia was disclosed this week by Mrs. Ned Litagmann, president of the Livonia Health Guild.

The first clinic will be held on Wednesday, November 3, with monthly clinics to be held on the first Wednesday of each month after that time.

All children from three months to five years of age will be provided with physical examinations, provided that their parents are not financially able to afford this routine medical service. Children having a referral from a private physician will also be taken care of at the clinic.

Children must have appointments for the clinic. They can be obtained by calling Livonia 5609. Children who are sick will not be taken. If, due to sickness or any other reason an appointment cannot be kept, it is requested that notification be given in advance. Cancellations may be made by calling 5609.

Roll Call: Yes, Cavanaugh, Conroy, Lindbergh, Nay, Loomis.

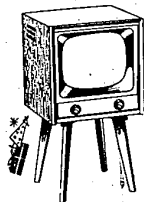
