Noted Lecturer To Speak At Methodist Church

Rev. Walter J. Field, lecturer, English educator and missionary from the Holy Land, will present his timely lecture and sound motion pictures on "Life in War-Torn Palestine" at the First Methodist Church, Sunday, October 24, at 11:15 a.m.

He has recently returned from the Holy Land and is now on a lecture tour. Mr. Field is a native of the British Isles and has spent more than 14 years in Palestine and middle eastern countries.

In the picture and lecture, Mr. Field will show and discuss the problem of Palestine and speak of his experience while living and working with both the Jews and the Arabs. During the war Mr. Field served with the British Middle East Army, after which he returned to the Holy Land to resume his work. From these years of first-hand experience he is a well-qualified speaker on the Jewish-Arab struggle for the land of Palestine.

The film, "The Holy Land Passing Parade," which Mr. Field will show is a complete and original sound film on Palestine. Contrasting the life of the modern Jew in the State of Israel and the life of the native Palestinian as he carries on the customs and traditions common in Bible days. It features a coverage of the entire country from Dan to Beersheba.

Mr. Field will show pictures, in sound and color, of the work of the Mission which he represents.

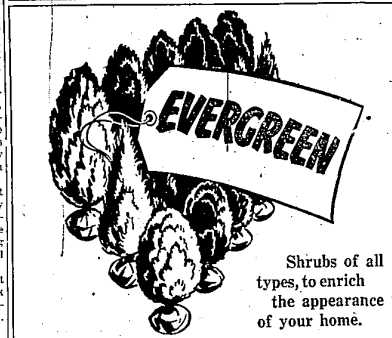
WASHING NYLON

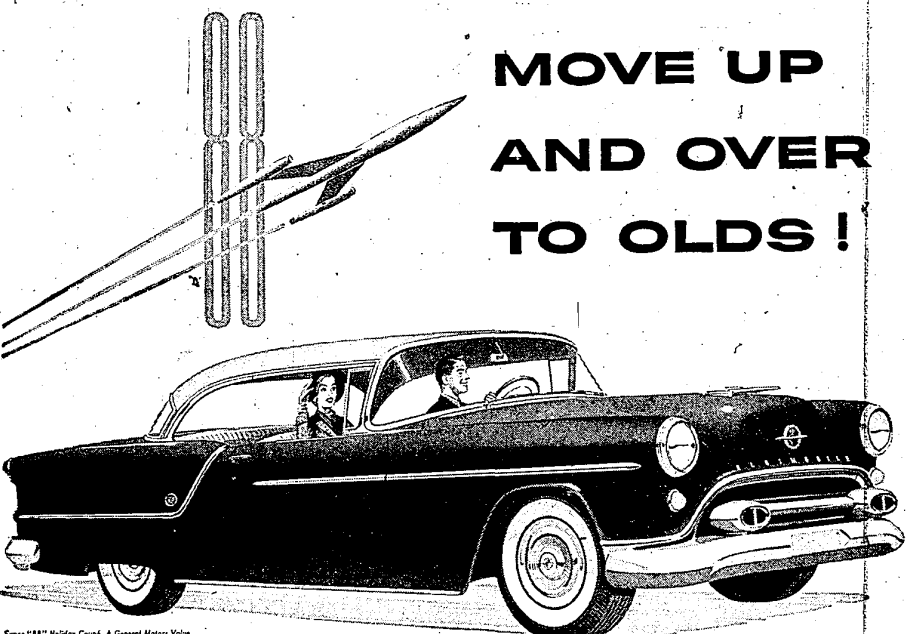

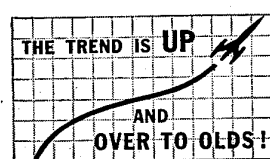
