will be for enough ahead to avoid a third consecutive recount.

Best bet: The winner will be ahead by at least 35,000 when all the votes are counted.

At stake in the election is control of top appointive positions in state government.

The Republican Senate refused to act on almost 100 top appointments as a stated policy in the hopes of electing a Republican governor November 2.

"We've saved enough so that the next governor can get control of all the top agencies with his appointments in the first two years," said Senator Edward Hutchinson of Farmington.

"And what if Williams returns for a fourth term?"

"We'll probably confirm most of them," said Hutchinson. "He will have deserved it if he wins."

Fishing In Michigan As Popular As Last Year

Fishing has been as popular a sport in Michigan this year as it was last year - and almost to the decimal point.

A recent conservation department summary of fishing license sales showed that 759,069 resident fishing licenses were reported sold to October 1 this year while 759,001 were sold to the same date last year.

Also, 244,313 temporary and annual non-resident licenses were reported sold this year as against 243,434 to the same date last year.

Trout stamp sales totaled 144,744 to October 1 this year and 164,996 to that date last year.
