Heraty, hospital Catholic chaplain, conducted the invocation and benediction.

# POINTERS GIVEN ON CARE OF AUTOMATIC DRIERS

If you have recently installed an automatic clothes drier, home management specialists at Michigan State College offer you these pointers for successful operation of the machine:

First, watch the lint trap. It should be emptied after every load is dried. This is necessary to allow for a free flow of air.

A full lint trap slows the drying process - and increases operating costs. If it gets too full it may even become a fire hazard.

Another point to remember - separate the clothes which take about the same drying time and dry them together.

Do not overload the drier. A normal washing machine load is all that should be put in a drier at one time.

Do not mix wet or damp clothing with partly dried items that are already in the drier. It is a good idea, however, to remove clothing from the drier when it is still damp in order to eliminate sprinkling of the garments you put in later.

And - it is important to avoid over-drying of clothing because this gives a hard, brittle texture to the fabrics that are difficult to take out.

Home-makers often ask home management specialists at Michigan State College about the drying of clothing in an automatic clothes drier.

Some home-makers wonder if that lint doesn't indicate that the drier causes a great deal of wear to the clothes.

But, Lucile Ketchum, extension home management specialist at Michigan State College, points out this fact: You probably have just washed a lot of clothes more - many times in line drying than you do in use of a drier.

The difference is - lint from line drying just blows away so you don't notice it.

Miss Ketchum reports that actual tests have shown that such items as sheets, pillow slips, broadcloth shirts, linen towels, cotton dress goods, rayon and nylon slips - all of these items lost less in tensile strength when they were dried in a drier.

On the other hand, it is true that fabrics with a considerable amount of nap, such as terry cloth towels and diapers lost a little bit more in strength when they were dried in the drier than they did on the line.


