She will be staying overnight at Camp Narris Friday to finish up.

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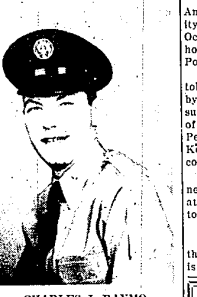
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Local Boy Named 'Airman Of Month'

CONSERVATION DEPT. SEEKS MORE OPERATING FUNDS

More state parks, more conservation officers, more fish are demanded by Michigan's soaring population.

With an eye to future demands, the conservation commission approved budget requests for 1953 totaling a whopping \$17,755,062 during its recent October meeting.

Up \$1,000,000 from current appropriations, nearly three-fourths of the increase is represented in planned purchases of additional park lands and improvement of the present 59 state parks and recreation areas.

If the 1955 state legislature provides the money, the conservation department also will boost its uniformed officer force to 200 men from the present 177.

More study of warm water fishing problems at a cost of \$50,000, purchase of new public fishing sites and hunting lands, and additional improvement work on lakes and streams also are contemplated to keep up with public demands.

Request for most other programs were held close to present levels.
