Mr. and Mrs. John B. Reid were the sponsors at the christening of Valerie Cecilia, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Eley.

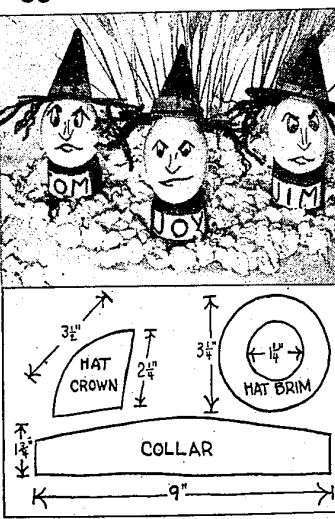

Eggs for Halloween Favors



Which is witch? None! They're all good eggs in witches' hats. They're part of the fun at Halloween parties. Each is a favor to take home or consume on the spot. Each bears the guest's name on its collar and can be used as a place card.

The hand-dipped look on the shell is achieved with a black crayon or a few strokes of a paint brush dipped in pure vegetable coloring. Assemble a few hard-cooked eggs in array such as this, surround with popcorn, use sheaves of grain (or autumn leaves) for background - and presto!

You have a centerpiece to radiate magic for Halloween. Here's how it's done:

Cut witches' hats and collars from black paper, using above pattern.

Twist collars into circles of size to hold eggs and fasten with paste. Then paste names of guests on collars.

Make witches' hats by joining the two straight edges of the crown on the inside with cellulose tape. Attach crown to hat brim with more tape. Use pieces of wool yarn for witches' hair by pasting to under side of brim.

When hard-cooked eggs, cover them in pan with water to come at least one inch above eggs. After boiling rapidly to boiling, turn off heat. Cover and let stand 15 minutes. Then cool promptly and thoroughly in cold water. This helps prevent dark surface on yolks.

New State Maps
Now Available

The second edition of the 1954 official state highway map, prepared by the State Highway Department, is now available for distribution to the public.

A limited number of new maps is now available at the Map Enterprise office. The map is also available at the highway department district office in Redford or may be obtained by writing to the Public Information division of the highway department in Lansing.

The front of the map contains city sections showing trunkline routes in major cities of the state and a mileage chart showing distances between principal cities. On the back of the map is a large sectional map of the metropolitan Detroit and surrounding area, a transcontinental map giving distances and driving times between principal cities of the country, and a number of signs similar to those on state highways and city streets to encourage safe driving habits among motorists.

The back of the map also contains the 1954 Michigan State Fair schedule, and lists showing the location of the state parks, recreational areas, historical sites, state fish hatcheries, trout rearing stations, national and state forests, game project areas, public fishing sites, state land open to hunting and fishing, conservation department district headquarters, state police posts, an index to cities and an index to county seats and counties.

DO IT YOURSELF

Turpentine, gasoline, carbon tetrachloride and similar solvents should never be used to take the scale off plastic tile walls. They dull the tile, and nothing can be done to bring back the gloss once it's gone. Use only mild soap or the special cleaning agents recommended by tile manufacturers.

Here are the requirements to check when considering taking an instructor's course:

You must be at least 15 years of age and the holder of a current Senior Life Saving certificate. Add to this a desire to teach and to give service.

If all you possess are the last two qualifications, why not start at the bottom? If you're a non-swimmer, learn: if you swim learn life saving. Now we're up to date. Starting at the bottom is better than staying there.

TIPS GIVEN ON
LIGHTING FLOOR-TO-CEILING BOOKCASE

There are several ways to illuminate a floor-to-ceiling bookcase. One is to place the bookcase against the wall and use the built-in lighting. Another is to use track lighting. A third is to use a combination of the two.

One system is to attach to the top molding of the bookcase the type of long reflector lamp that is often used in museums to light paintings.

Also, directional spot lights can be recessed in the ceiling directly in front of the shelves. Or you can hang "bullet" lights from the ceiling and aim them at the shelves.

Junior Gardeners will be guests at the meeting.

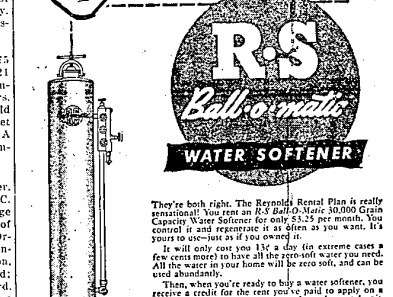

REPAIR SAGGING CONCRETE

A sagging section of concrete walk can be fixed by filling in underneath with aggregate. Tilt up the sagging section with a crowbar or stout iron pipe. Fill underneath with gravel, cinders, or sand, and tamp down firmly. This will "heave up" the walk, preventing water puddles from forming.

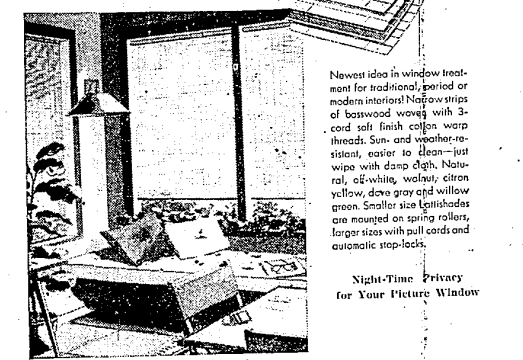
