Educator States Pre-School Children Should Have Knowledge Of Colors

One of the best ways to find out something about the activities in which youngsters participate in school is to examine the materials that are used, states a noted professor of education.

One of the very noticeable differences is the large number of attractively colored pictures in recent books, especially at the lower elementary school level. Where once upon a time only five to ten percent of the total space in a book was devoted to pictures (most of them being black and white), now well over fifty percent of the pre-printers are colored pictures.

Furthermore, children now have a much greater variety of materials to work with than was available thirty or forty years ago. Almost every recent basic reading series has a number of workbooks which are used for sent work. Among other things, children color the pictures in the workbooks and in the kindergarten quite some time is devoted to this activity. If you have children in the lower elementary grades, you probably have seen some of this when they bring home their seat work.

Parents can help their children prepare for school activities by helping them learn to recognize colors. Strange as it may seem, many children come to kindergarten without this knowledge.

It is rather easy to help a youngster learn to recognize colors and it can be done in the regular routine of the home. For example, when dressing a three or four-year-old, ask if he wishes to wear his yellow T-shirt, or tell him his toothbrush is the one with

the blue handle. The colored towel sets, colored plastic dishes, colored pop corn bowls, etc., all provide opportunity for learning colors.

And don't forget to buy a set of crayons and a color book. There is no more inexpensive way to provide entertainment on those days when children must remain indoors. Children like parental participation in their activities. Help them select colors which blend but do not force a choice.

Teaching youngsters to learn the colors before entering school helps them develop a background for some of the reading readiness activities which occur at the kindergarten level.

He will also have gained some knowledge which can contribute to a feeling of self-confidence. Most youngsters are much less apprehensive about things they are asked to do if they feel that they have command of the basic elements. They will be better prepared for school tasks if they have knowledge of colors before going.

DO IT YOURSELF

To Lead Mission At Clarenceville

Members of the Clarenceville Methodist Church will participate October 30 to November 7 in a State-Wide Spiritual Life Mission being sponsored by nearly 1,000 churches of Michigan Methodist. According to the pastor, Rev. Elsie A. Johns, the Mission will seek commitments from members of the local church to church attendance, family devotions, private prayer, tithing and personal witnessing.

Plans call for the churches of the eastern section of the state to have guest ministers from the western part of the state for the Mission.

Special worship services featuring the preaching ministry of the guest ministers are scheduled for Sunday morning and evening, and Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings. The mission will close with a service of dedication on Sunday morning, November 7, with the local pastor preaching.

Pastors and their guest ministers will attend a Spiritual Life Training School at the First Methodist Church in Highland Park, Michigan, for four days during the Mission. The school will provide instruction in the Mission's program and record local, district and state progress by means of a unique state-wide ham radio broadcast network. Youth rallies, family nights and other activities are being scheduled in local churches as a part of the spiritual life emphasis.

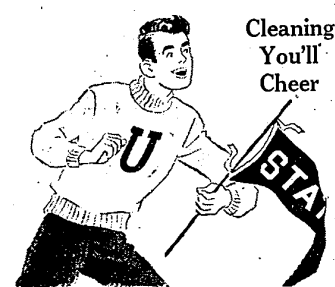
