First idea out of the hopper was to provide state support for the 15 community colleges now in operation. They offer the first two years of college, making room in the four-year schools.

The second alternative was to expand the four-year colleges, a plan already opposed by legislators, the public students and the colleges themselves.

It was left for Dr. Clarence C. Hilberry, president of Wayne University, to come up with the idea that some key lawmakers like best.

"We'd be in favor of a year-round college, with a full schedule of courses during the summer," Hilberry said.

Rep. Clarke E. Davis (R-Vermontville) was all in favor of it. "I don't mind a summer vacation for professors," he said, "but not all summer."

He said, "That idea might just help us solve our overcrowding problem on the campuses."

The church saved the Communist regime in Russia, and enabled it to become a threat to our national security, so American aid after the war made possible Europe's collectivistic and semi-collectivistic experiments. It is a reasonable inference that without American dollars the planners of Europe would have had to curtail their schemes, and Europe would have lifted itself up from the war by the simple and effective process of going to work and conserving its capital.

Dr. Palyl sees as America's international responsibility: "to bring the nations of the Old and New Worlds back to common sense and self-reliance — by letting them work out their own problems. America... owes leadership to the world, leadership in the direction of restoring sanity. The one way to accomplish that is to stop all aid to Europe other than in specific cases of emergency."
