Trojans Tounce Brighton Gridders Before Enthused Homecoming Crowd

An injury-riddled Clarencville football team coasted to their second straight shutout win and their fourth victory of the season, much to the delight of an enthusiastic homecoming crowd that braved the cold at the Trojan field last Friday afternoon.

Coach Nick Ianni's Trojans displayed the effects of playing with only two of the first string backs. Right halfback Bob Soop did not play at all and fullback Gene Garbin was injured early in the first period after scoring the first touchdown.

The Trojan offense slowed considerably because of the loss of its two best running backs, but got enough help from reserve strength to coast to the easy victory.

An alert defense started the Trojans rolling early as Bob Soop recovered a Bulldog fumble on the Brighton 40 yard line on the first offensive play of the game. With fullback Gene Garbin doing most of the carrying, the Trojans marched 40 yards in eight plays for their first score. Gene Garbin covered the last six yards on an off-tackle slide. Glen Reed passed to Dave Hanford for the extra point and the Trojans led 7-0.

Midway in the second quarter, the Trojans drove 63 yards to score. Dave Hanford and quarterback Glen Reed sparked the

Falcon Freshmen Down Parkers

The Farmington High Fresh defeated a much bigger Highland Park team 20-7 Wednesday, October 27, for their first win of the season.

The Fresh kicked off to the Parkers, and on the second play from scrimmage, Ben Ridings intercepted a pass and ran the ball back to Highland Park territory. The Falcons drove into the end zone a few plays later with Dave Catherman carrying the ball. Catherman also ran the extra point over and Farmington led 7-0.

The Fresh kicked off again, the Falcons ended and hit pay dirt but this time Highland Park ran a few plays later to tie the score. Farmington took the kick-off.

Shortly afterward Catherman again scored. The pass for an extra point failed and the Falcons led again 13-7 as the half ended. To start the second half, Highland Park kicked off and once more the Fresh drove for the touchdown. This time Curt Love drove over for the score. Love also scored the extra point on a run, and the Falcons led 20-7.

Throughout the rest of the game the Falcons kept to the ground and played an excellent defensive game.

This is the first time a Farmington freshman team has ever beaten a Highland Park freshman team.

At half time neither team had been able to hit pay dirt.

On the first exchange of the ball after the Vikings had kicked off to Farmington to open the second half, the Walled Lake team went on the move.

Failing to make a first down, the Falcons punted out of trouble. A Viking back promptly scampered to pay dirt. An intercepted Farmington pass set up Walled Lake's second TD a few minutes later. On one play they had gone over again and with the aid of an extra point were leading 13-6.

The Falcons scored their lone TD in a nip-and-tuck third period. A pass from Rice to Don Robinson, good for eight yards, started them rolling. Chuck Urquhart picked up five yards with Plautz adding enough for a first down. Another pass from Rice to Robinson connected and the Falcons were inside the ten. Three plays moved the ball in close with Rice plunging through the middle to score on the fourth down. A running try for the extra point failed.

With less than a minute left to play, the Vikings added their last touchdown. Intercepting a Farmington pass, they carried back to the 10 and pushed over from there on the ground. The extra point try was good and the game ended with the Falcons again on the short end.
