Farmington is being beseiged with a storm of new home developments which are reaching tremendous proportions, and from all indications this is only the beginning. For example, just two of the present subdivisions now under development in the city will, when completed, nearly double the 1950 population. A similar percentage of increase is being experienced in the township, with a great deal of attractive land still open.

Even now the situation is becoming rather rough, with increased demands for vital services, and yet the height of the storm is still to come. Some steps have been taken in an effort to secure the ship, but we are still vulnerable. A start has been made to establish planning in the city, but unfortunately too many have failed to recognize its importance. Public interest and support is essential to the success of any community planning. Progress is being made in the township toward the eventual establishment of sewer and water districts. Those programs were initiated largely by public demand and are important to the future of the township.

But are we looking ahead as far as we can and should? Are we tying all these unit projects into an over-all master plan for the entire community? Are we coordinating our efforts within our community and with our adjoining neighbors? Last week city officials stated that an attempt would be made to entourage an area authority for sewage treatment to include the more heavily populated areas of Farmington as well as neighboring townships. Through such cooperation a more economical and more adequate service can be provided. This is planning with a purpose and a future.
