Place Seventh In State Meet

In a State Cross Country meet at Michigan State Normal College, Ypsilanti, last week, the Farmington Falcons placed seventh in a field of 15 schools. A total of 135 runners took part in the meet.

Dick Grimshaw finished strong for the Falcons and placed fourth in the entire field of runners. A terrific last-leg sprint moved him up from twelfth to fourth after the mile and a half mark.

The places of the top five Falcons in the meet are as follows: Dick Grimshaw, 38; Dick Sutherland, 76; and Chuck O'Connor, 85.

Coach Humble had special praise for Chuck O'Connor for his excellent showing as fifth man on the team. He is a sophomore running with the team for the first year.

End Unvictorious Season Of Play

In the final game of a humiliating season of play last Friday the Farmington Falcons went down in defeat to the Bentley Bulldogs of Livonia, 34 - 0.

The Falcons thus ended an entire season of play without the taste of a victory.

The Bulldogs started their scoring attack early in the game when they recovered a Falcon fumble and scampered to pay dirt. Two pass plays were all that was needed on the next exchange of the ball to give them their second tally.

A good pass followed by a grinding series of plays on the ground gave the Bulldogs their third TD. At halftime they left the field with a comfortable 20 - 0 margin.

In the third period the Bulldogs showed no letup and early in the quarter drove 55 yards for touchdown number four. For the remainder of the period they were content to hold defensively, opening the fourth quarter they again romped to pay dirt on a sweep around end, giving them a total of 34 points. Bulldog substitutes played the remainder of the game.

Hunters Urged To Carry Essential Safety Equipment

State conservation department workers are urging that hunters planning northern trips this year carry at least a compass, matches and a map of the county being hunted.

These three items may spell the difference between life and death for even the most experienced woodsman. Mixed with a little common sense, they have often saved hunters from a gloomy woodland doom.

The compass and map have to be trusted. When the compass seems to be going the wrong way, the hunter should follow its lead.

Detailed maps of each of Michigan's counties are available free from conservation offices. Hunters should note road and stream directions, distances and location of towns, farms and other points.

Law officers, who help find lost persons, say panic is the most dangerous enemy facing the hunter.

"The best thing is to build a fire, sit down and consider the situation," says E. E. Tucker, in charge of law enforcement work. "Keep warm and conserve energy," he adds, "and when you decide from the map and compass which way to move, go in one direction by lining up trees ahead and guiding on them."

Nearly All Special Deer Permits Will Be Taken

About 65,000 special season deer hunting permits have been mailed to hunters.

Conservation department workers mailed the permits ahead of schedule to give hunters more time to make fall hunting plans.

Built around November 1, the deadline for application, were about 16,000 permits, but an eleven-hour rush of mail promised a sharp cut in this surplus. State workers said the final count would probably show quotas filled for all except area A and that about two-thirds of the permits for this area would be assigned.

Trojans End Brilliant Season Of Play, Wallop Keego Harbor In Finale, 32 - 6

A second-half surge by an aroused Trojan grid team netted 25 points last Friday against Keego Harbor, giving the Clarencville Trojans a one-sided 32 - 6 victory in the season finale.

The victory marked the Trojans' third straight and gave them a 5 - 3 record for the season. Only a heart-breaking one-point defeat to Clarkston separated the Clarencville eleven from a tie for first place.

Remarkable improvement with every game characterized the Trojans' team this season. Against their last three opponents, the Trojans piled up 76 points while holding their foes to a meager 6, proving this statement.

The game Friday marked the final appearance of four outstanding Trojan seniors: Captain Bob Grose, Quarterback Glenn Reed, End Bob Snell and Richard Godette. They ended their high school careers in a blaze of glory.

Quarterback Glenn Reed called his usual line game of football; scored two TD's and connected on 7 of 11 passes. Captain Bob Grose was spectacular on the offensive and scored two extra points. End Bob Snell scored on 11-yard end-around play and Richard Godette caught four passes for 63 yards.

The game started out like a pattern of last year's game as the Keego forward wall halted the Trojan offense and forced the Trojans to kick from their own end zone early in the second period. A fine return of the punt by Dennis Singleton put the ball on the Trojans' 18-yard line and in five plays Herb Victor scored two touchdowns on the 18-yard line and Keego led 6 - 0. The Trojans then took the kickoff and drove 61 yards to score. A fine 33 yard run by halfback Bob Snop set the stage for Glen Reed to sneak it over from the one-yard line. The extra point was good and the Trojans led at halftime 7 - 6.

Fullback Gene Garbin broke the game wide open in the third period with two spectacular runs. The first, a 42-yard gallop, put the ball on the Keego 4, from which point Glen Reed took it over for his second touchdown. Several minutes later Gene Garbin electrified the crowd by scampering 31 yards on an off-tackle play to put the game out of reach at 19 - 6.

Fine passing by Quarterback Glen Reed set up the next two TD's in the fourth quarter. End Bob Snell carried 11 yards on an end around play to climax a 52-yard drive and Fullback Gene Garbin rammed 10 yards for the final score. Bob Grose added the extra point to make the final score read Clarencville 32, Keego Harbor 6.

Dingell-Johnson projects, administered by the state game and fish departments, have included construction of lakes and ponds, stream improvement, research, and other activities.

SCOUTS TO HOLD CLOTHING DRIVE IN DETROIT AREA

Boy Scouts of the Detroit Area Council will hand out "Good Turn Day" bags throughout the metropolitan area on Saturday, November 20, it was announced this week by Peter Duffy, co-chairman of the Boy Scout Drive.

This is the first step in a significant "Good Turn" planned by the Scouts on behalf of Goodwill Industries, largest employer of handicapped people in the state.

The second step is "Good Turn Day" itself, on Saturday, November 27. On this day the Scouts will return to collect the bags filled with discarded clothing. The clothing drive will give every person in the metropolitan area a chance to help the Boy Scouts help the handicapped help themselves.

About 250,000 Good Turn Bags will be distributed in this all-out house-to-house campaign.

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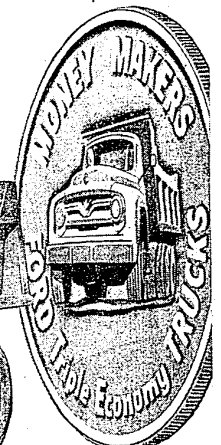
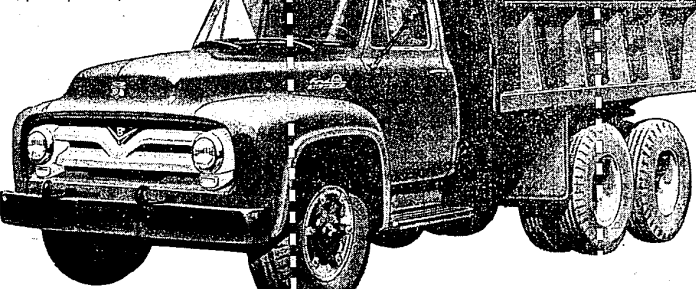
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
