Two Westland sisters, Mrs. Mariana Adkins and Mrs. Linda Morin, were a bit surprised last fall when they realized both were expecting babies late in May.

Their doctor, Conrad Pearl, of Garden City, was surprised too. He figured the babies would be born this week, a day apart.

But the second child of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Adkins decided to arrive early. Roger Anthony Adkins checked in at Botsford Hospital in Farmington in the early hours of Monday, May 21. He weighed four pounds, 15 ounces.

Dr. Pearl delivered him and hardly had time for a cup of coffee before the second child, Jeremy Edmond Morin, was born. He weighed in at six pounds five ounces just an hour and a half later in the same hospital.

The Morins took Jeremy home late last week. Small Roger had to stay in the hospital to gain a bit more weight before joining his parents and three-year-old sister, Toby.

Maybe the busiest cigar-distributor was Tobias Olivera of Westland, father of the two new mothers and the only grandpa both little boys have. They are his sixth and seventh grandchildren.

fun than ever if the teacher or mom plays, too.

The play sessions at school are used for auditory training, speech readiness, and manipulative skills.

As children approach age three, they begin to attend school sessions twice a week, and with another child or two, to prepare for the pre-school program for three and four year-olds, at school five mornings a week.

During the infant program, nursery age children with normal hearing come to play with the children in the program.

"Even at this early age they need to begin experiences with other children in a hearing world," said Mrs. Bajorek.

An important aspect of the infant counseling program is parent training and counseling, which benefits grandparents as well as mothers and fathers.

Parent counseling helps them understand their child's handicap and how it affects him.

In regular meetings for parents, they receive information about their child's training.

Parents may contact Kaselemlis by calling Redford Union schools to apply for help for their hearing handicapped babies. Families who live outside the six-school district sending area may call for referral.

Cost of hearing aids is not included in the program, but Kaselemlis and Mrs. Bajorek will advise parents how to apply for financial help if needed. Information is also available regarding services for other handicaps the hearing-impaired child might have.
