

C'ville Sets Summer Term

Summer school will be held at Clarenceville High School again this year. Purposes of summer school are to allow students to make up for the failure of required courses and to provide them an opportunity to earn necessary credits to advance to the next grade level and for enrichment.

Courses will be offered in English, mathematics, science, history, government, economics and play production.

Summer school will begin on Monday, June 25, and end on Monday, Aug. 6. Students may take two classes and earn one half credit per class. Classes are two hours in length starting at 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. for five days per week for six weeks. The cost is \$25 per class payable Monday, June 25. Credit will not be granted to students who are absent more than three days.

Students should report to Room 117 in the high school at 8 a.m. Monday, June 25, for registration and orientation. For more information, call the high school guidance office.

Learn To Swim At C'ville

Advance registration for summer student swimming classes at Clarenceville will be held June 11-15 from 1 to 3 p.m. at the Clarenceville High School office.

Swimming sessions are scheduled to start Monday, June 18; Monday, July 9; and Monday, July 23. Each session consists of 10 one-hour lessons each/weekend for two weeks.

Students must be 48 inches in height or be able to pass the Red Cross beginner's test to participate.

Class time will be determined at the time of registration. Instruction will be offered from 8 a.m. to 12 noon in beginner, advanced beginner, intermediate and advanced swimming. All instructors are adult certified by the Red Cross. Fee is \$7.

A fourth session will be added if there is sufficient demand. It would begin Monday, August 6. Call William Waters at Clarenceville High School regarding the classes.

\$15,000 In Job Funds Go To Clarenceville

The Clarenceville School District has learned from Oakland County that it will receive approximately \$15,000 under the Emergency Employment Act of 1971 to carry on a program that was initiated last year.

The amount is about half of what the district received last year, according to Ed Saliz, district business manager.

The money will be used for the employment of three persons, he said. One will be a custodian, and the other will be a matron, both of whom were previously employed. Added will be an audio-visual equipment repairman. Employment begins on June 1 and will continue "until the money runs out."

Main objective of the government program is to make funds available to public employers to be used to provide unemployed or under-employed persons in the area with transitional jobs for needed public service in times of high unemployment.

Saliz said the district last year had six persons employed. All were custodial workers.

At the end of the year when the appropriation ran

out, Saliz said, the district was able to phase some of the workers into regular jobs with the district and assisted several others in obtaining employment elsewhere.

Interestingly, Saliz said, through Wayne County the district was only able to get

enough money last year to pay for a crossing guard for the skywalk at the high school.
