Is The Law Tough?

"It's a jungle down there — you throw them up against the wall and the guns and knives fall out — that's the only way you handle them."

It was the kind of remark that sets a lew heads nodding up and down and some other eyes rolling towards the ceiling, an off-hand lunch-hour comment on one guy's reason why cops should get tough in Detroit.

When the cops get tough, the crime rate is bound

It is one straight thinking applied to one of life's inksome problems in the big city.

At which boint my mind drifted to crime in downtown Farmington.

Practically speaking, there isn't any.

Not just days, but weeks go by without a breakin, let alone a robbery or mugging. Farmington's city streets don't echo with screams in the might.

If a police department free from handcuffs, allowed to "do their job," reduces crime, then Farmington's force must be a master of up-against-the-wall techniques.

Motorists along the side of the road with their hands on top of their cars, getting frisked; late-night breakins without warrants; bruised prisoners and long confinement before arraignment must be part of the price the community pays for its low crime rate - right?

of the price the community pays for its low crime rate – right? Wrong.

In fact, just the opposite is true.

To make an unfair comparison, the Farmington force is superior to Detroit's in the following ways:

There are a lot more of them, about five times as many per capita. (Although the local force also handles fires, one can imagine what this means in terms of officers per reported crime.)

They handle nearly every case that comes into the office, whether it is an old lady locked out of her car or a robbery.

They follow professional and legal procedure, without relying on "street tough" reputations. One result is a high clearance rate on prosecutions.

They know most of the people in wm.
The administration has a tight control over the operation of the whole department.
This may have the appearance of a joke, trying to compare the 28-man force of a town of barely 10,000 middle-class folks to an urban center trying to cope with most of the nation's social ills.

It does nothing to explain what goes on in someone's head to make him suddenly decide his victim is excommunicated from the human race and somehow deserves a knock on the head or a bullet.
But if the goal is law and order, it would seem worthwhile to look at areas where a system works, rather than indulge in Mickey Spillane-type fantasies. of police violence.
