## NEARLY 72,000 SPECIAL ANY DEER PERMITS AWARDED

Distribution of about 72,000 permits for hunting in Michigan's special any-deer season were completed early last week.

Harry Cox, in charge of distribution, said all but a handful of the permits were mailed during the first week of November. He said pre-assigned quotas for areas B and D were filled and that area A was about half filled before the November 1 deadline for application. No further applications are being considered.

"We have mailed 40,188 permits for area D, 21,435 for area B and 10,681 for area A," he added. Final late applications are now being processed.

The three areas are located in the northern lower peninsula. On December 1, a permit-holder can take any deer he sees in his assigned area, unless he has bagged a deer earlier in the season. Each licensed hunter is allowed one deer per season, whether taken in archery, regular or special season; the permit is invalid if the hunter bags his deer in one of the earlier seasons.

## ASK FOR CHANGES IN CONSERVATION PROGRAM IN STATE

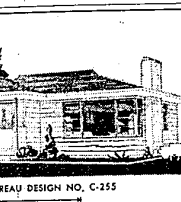
The conservation commission discussed the program for the coming legislative year at a recent meeting. It included requests that the legislature:

1. Change the general trout season opening date from the last Saturday in April to the second Saturday in May and that the closing date be shifted from the second Sunday in September to the second Sunday in October.
2. Authorize a number of areas of state land for experimental management of various wildlife species such as quail and muskrat.
3. Continue commission discretionary authority over the lower peninsula deer herd.
4. Authorize an annual \$2 windshield sticker for sale to state park patrons to provide revenue for parks improvements.
5. Repeal the fox bounty and black squirrels.
6. Provide an open season on black squirrels.

The commission also asked department workers to study the possibility of removing creek limits on bluegills, sunfish, warmouth and rock bass, crappies and perch. Included in the program were requests for several changes in commercial fishing laws and clarification of phrasing in certain statutes.
