

Straits Ferries Carry More Cars Than Last Year

Traffic on the State ferries across the Straits of Mackinac for the first ten months of 1954 increased 1.2 per cent above that of the same period in 1953, Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler announces.

The State ferries, a division of the State Highway Department, carried 757,311 vehicles across the Straits in the first ten months of this year, compared to 750,046 for the same period in 1953.

(Continued from Page One) provided before such a plan could be initiated.

The Council passed a motion approving the installation of a curb depositary at the request of the Farmington Street Bank subject to the approval of the City Manager. The depositary, which is approximately 18 inches square, will be located on Grand River just west of the intersection of Farmington Road. It will be approximately car window height and will be accessible both from the sidewalk and curb.

Mrs. L. W. Heals, representing the Ten Mile School P. T. A., appeared before the Council to request action on the construction of a sidewalk along Ten Mile Road from the school building east to Powers Road. Mrs. Heals stated that the sidewalk was necessary in view of the ever-increasing number of students in the vicinity who will be walking to the school. The Council stated that the city can't build sidewalks under present ordinances.

A motion was made and approved authorizing a renewal of the present police radio contract with the township subject to an increase in cost from \$1,000 per year, effective January 1, 1955. This is the fee paid to the city for the furnishing of an operator 24 hours a day.

The Council approved a motion authorizing the Farmington School District to contract with the new Tuck Road School to the city system on Shilbawee in Floral Park, providing that the city is not obligated to maintenance of the private line. The action was taken following a survey and recommendation from the City Manager.

At the present time an area west of Schroeder Road and north of Twelve Mile Road is unclassified and not included in the zoning ordinance. It is proposed that the area be zoned as R-4 in compliance with the surrounding territory.

The final declaration involves the rezoning of a parcel of land on the west side of Farmington Road near Flanders from residential to commercial. A petition signed by 420 registered voters was submitted to the Board several weeks ago requesting action on the proposed change, which would clear the way for the establishment of a grocery store in a building located on the property.

THE SPECIFIC purposes of the meeting will be to explore methods and procedures for developing sewage facilities in certain areas of which the City of Farmington is roughly the hub. Officials stated that it is particularly desired to discuss whether it may be desirable and practical to develop a joint solution to some of the problems arising from extensive residential developments recently underway and now proposed in many places in this general area. It was pointed out that these problems may include, in addition to sewage disposal, the need for a more adequate water supply.

Besides the public officials from the various cities and townships, representatives of the City of Detroit and the Counties of Oakland and Wayne are being invited to attend the meeting, along with legal and financial advisors.

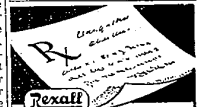
(Continued from Page One) held legal advice from three attorneys present at the meeting, and initial legal steps were proposed in an effort to prevent the moving of the buildings into the township.

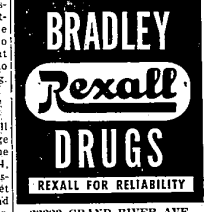

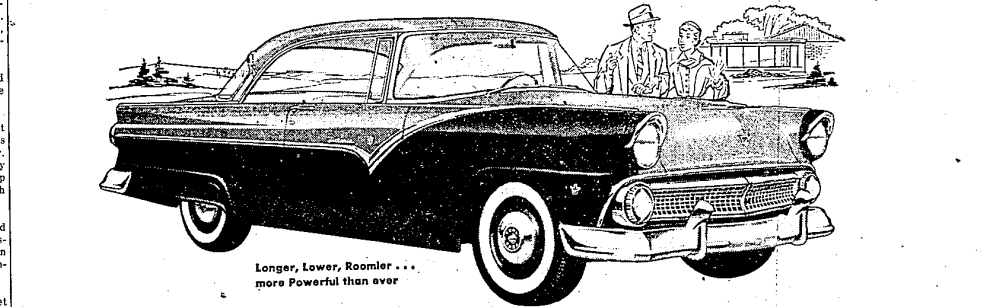

The proposed increase in capital is warranted by the large increase in deposits during the last three years. As of the date of the last call of the Michigan State Banking Department, October 7, 1954, the capital structure of the Farmington State Bank was: common stock, \$100,000; surplus, \$300,000; and undivided profits, \$210,128.17.
