Engineers for the City of Detroit, suggested that the proposed area might be serviced through the Detroit system. He stated that an extension might be made from the Six Mile Road intersection out Grand River to the eastern limits of Farmington. Palmer stated that this would undoubtedly be less expensive than the construction and maintenance of a sewage treatment plant, and could be done in a comparatively short period of time. He added that this was a suggestion which would have to be studied before a definite commitment could be made. However, Palmer stated that it appears tentatively as though the City of Detroit might handle the sewage from this area.

Donald Pierce of the State Health Department stated that the suggestion was very encouraging and recommended that the committee secure the necessary information in their respective areas for presentation to Palmer at a later meeting. All of the officials at the meeting pointed out the necessity for prompt action in the solving of the sewage problem.

Township Zoning

The request of property owners in a portion of Section 8 for zoning of an "unclassified" area and a petition for rezoning of a parcel of land on Farmington Road near Flanders. All three amendments will be open for public discussion at the December 29 meeting.

THE MICHIGAN Consolidated zoning ordinance, which covers the rezoning of five parcels of land on Northwestern Highway and Fourteen Mile Road which are located adjacent to the present Gas Company installation. The three parcels on Fourteen Mile Road would be rezoned from residential to industrial while the two parcels on Northwestern would be rezoned from commercial to industrial. This petition is a modification of an earlier request which was turned down by the Township Board.

The second proposal, concerns the zoning of an "unclassified" area located north of Twelve Mile Road and west of Schroeder Road in Section 8. The action was prompted by notification of plans to move a series of duplex housing units onto the property. The proposal designates that the property will be zoned as Residential IV.

The third proposal involves the rezoning of a parcel of land on South Farmington Road near Flanders from residential to commercial. Approval of the amendment would make way for the establishment of a grocery store in a building located on the property. A total of 420 registered voters in the area have signed a petition favoring the zoning change.

High School Addition Going Up

Work on the new addition at the Farmington High School on Shilawassee is progressing nicely with footings all poured and most of the block work completed. The addition is a combination gymnasium - auditorium as well as additional class rooms. Workmen are shown above as they work on the portion of the addition being tied-in to the west end of the present school structure. The total addition will extend almost the entire length of the rear of the present building.
