



### Revamped Postal Regulation Book Now Available

Postmaster Henry Trombley of Farmington called to the attention of mail users major new postal regulations which will provide important changes and simplifications in the use of the mails.

The Post Office Department is issuing a final edition of a history-making new Postal Manual which contains these changes in simple form. The new manual will bring together in less than 300 pages public-interest postal regulations formerly scattered through 4,000 pages of dense print. Postmaster Trombley explained.

This publication may be obtained at 65 cents a copy from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington 25, D.C. And mail users anxious to keep abreast of all changes in this material that may be made from time to time may get both the pamphlet in loose-leaf format and a year's subscription to all sheets making changes for a total of \$2, also from the Superintendent of Documents, the postmaster noted.

The revision of the Postal Manual, Postmaster Trombley said, represents what Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield has described is the most complete revision of regulations in the history of the U. S. Post Office Department.

Postmaster Trombley noted that the new pamphlet and the new \$2 package deal give the businessmen and other large mail users the easiest, most complete method of keeping completely up to date on postal information that they have ever had.

The booklet is also an invaluable guide for the average householder. It shows, for example, how to package fragile materials for mailing; how to attach first-class letters to packages; how stamps of unwanted denominations that are unused may be exchanged for others of different values if desired. It also tells about many other matters of special interest to all mail users, he added.

Killers. Even now, another of Michigan's home-developed wonder drugs is nearing production.

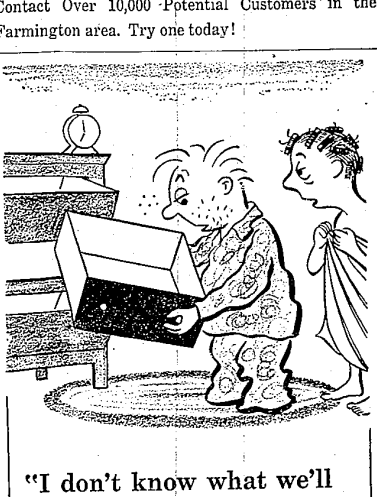

### POST CARD POLLS WILL BE EXTENDED TO SMALL GAME

The annual post card polls of deer and pheasant hunting information have proved so successful in recent years that Michigan's conservation department is planning to extend their use to take in small game hunting activity.

As in the last two years, the department will again conduct separate firearms and archery deer pools, slated to start in early December.

In addition, the small game poll, new this year, will take in all other hunting activities through December 1.

A separate poll on cottontail rabbit and snowshoe hare hunting may be held at the conclusion of those seasons early next year, although no definite plans for this have been made.

As in the past, a statistical sample of hunters will be asked to report their hunting success through the polls.

The polls have been approved by the University of Michigan Survey Research Center as capable of providing accurate checks of game hunting information.
