DROOPY CUPCAKES

Putting too much batter in cupcake tins will cause cakes to spill over the sides when baked, rather than form smoothly rounded tops. Never fill cups more than 2/3 full and only 1/2 full if you are using a batter mixed by the quick method. Properly mixed batter should form a cupcake with a slightly rounded top rather than a peak. A peak indicates over-mixing.

SUGGESTIONS FOR
PREPARING
GELATIN MOLDS

Since entertaining at dessert and coffee or at teas has become such a well-liked custom, the party gelatin mold, the frozen dessert mold, and the lovely fruit platter have increased in popularity.

These same salads lend color and appetite appeal to the buffet table also and are often served as a combination salad and dessert. Fancy party sandwiches, small appetizers and assorted appetizers are also popular.

There are several important things to keep in mind when preparing gelatin molds. Cover molds with waxed paper or aluminum foil to prevent pots from drying. Be sure to drain canned fruits thoroughly to avoid diluting the gelatin. Save syrup to use as part of the liquid for added flavor.

To mold large pieces of fruit in a definite pattern, arrange each layer of fruit in gelatin that has been chilled to the consistency of unbroken egg white, and allow to set before adding the next layer.

To unmold, loosen edge of mold with small knife and quickly immerse mold just to the top in lukewarm water — hot water will melt the mold. Shake mold to loosen gelatin. If mold is large, place serving dish for top of mold, invert, and lift mold off carefully. Extra large molds may break if unmolded directly on crisp greens. It's very easy to surround the mold with green art if it is on the serving platter. Individual molds may be unmolded directly on greens.

BREAKFAST TREAT
OF PECAN ROLLS
QUICK, EASY TO MAKE

Does your family like fresh, hot rolls for breakfast? If you use a biscuit mix, you can make piping hot butter pecan rolls for breakfast treats in a matter of minutes. Just follow this recipe.

Combine butter or margarine, sugar and molasses. Spread evenly in bottom of 8 by 2 inch aluminum pan. Sprinkle evenly with pecan halves. Set aside. Combine eggs, milk, and cooled shortening. In another bowl, blend sugar and biscuit mix thoroughly. Quickly add milk mixture stirring just until well blended. Turn out on pastry cloth or board generously dusted with biscuit mix. Knead about 10 times.

Make individual rolls by pinching off balls of dough the size of a small egg. Or pat dough lightly into 6 by 6 inch rectangle and cut into 16 equal pieces. Dip top of each piece into mixture of one tablespoon sugar and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Place pieces, sugared side up, on hot mixture in pan. Use scissors to snip tops of rolls in quarters. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) for about 30 minutes. Turn upside down on serving plate. Let pan remain on rolls for one minute. Remove pan. Makes 16 rolls.

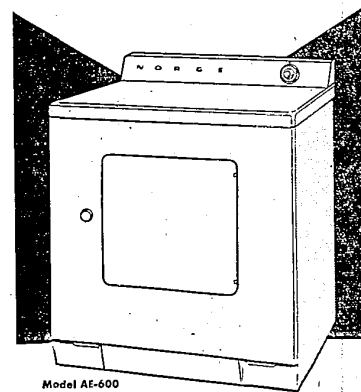
