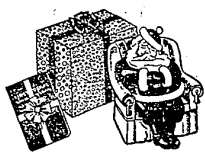

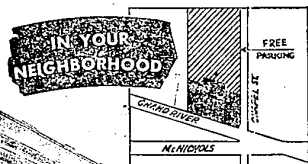

A typical night for C. A. P. consists of classes and marching drills. Class instruction in one particular area usually lasts about ten weeks.

Requirements for C. A. P. are very high. A minimum age of fourteen years, good reputation, and a citizen of the United States are all that are necessary. Until you become eighteen years old you are classified as a Cadet; after that you may become a Senior.

Commanding Officer of the Squadron is Lieut. John McCalland, who was a World War II Air Force veteran. He is hired by the Michigan section of the Civil Air Patrol, an Auxiliary of the U. S. Air Force.

Interested students who meet the age requirement are invited to attend a Tuesday session.

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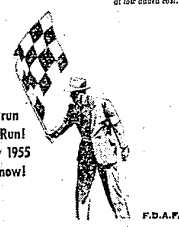
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
