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HANDLED PROPERLY, CHILD CAN BECOME HAPPY JUNIOR COOK

A little girl or boy seriously engrossed in cooking is an entrancing sight, and the skill and success of these beginners is often quite surprising.

But junior cooking isn't something that just grows; it needs the right kind of encouragement from mother, authorities state.

It is important that a child learn to cook the right way and that the learning process be a lot of fun. Whether or not it will be fun depends on mother's attitude and how she goes about teaching.

Let's face it. Washing and peeling potatoes and washing pans are necessary but hardly enjoyable phases of cooking. The real fun in cooking comes from making something that is eaten and really appreciated.

As a first step in encouraging an interest in cooking, have your child put the finishing touches on a dessert.

Even a four year old can sprinkle candy shot over a cake frosting or grind nuts over the meringue of a pie.

She can roll out a small piece of pie crust to fit a toy size pie pan. It may be a little battered and tough from constant handling, but who cares? She'll feel a sense of pride in her accomplishment and

that's the important thing. A child can flatten cookies with a toy rolling pin or a heavy tumbler after you have put the dough on the cookie sheet. And it won't be too long before she can shape dough in reasonably even balls.

True, it will take more of your time. Results may not be perfect, but the expression on your young-

ster's face when the family exclaims with delight over her cooking will be well worth it.

One important point to remember: Don't give your child any cooking job beyond her capacity. Keep the work simple until she is strong and tall enough to attempt the expression on your young-
